Description

This course is designed to provide learning opportunities in the costume area of production through hands-on assignments. Students will work on departmental productions and supplemental projects in a variety of capacities including costume construction, wardrobe, and shop organizational activities.

Course Objectives & Student Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- Obtain a working knowledge of costume production for live theatre
- Refine understanding and proficiency through practical application of learned techniques

Requirements

You must complete 75 hours by 5 pm on August 9th, 2023.

These required 75 hours will be divided between 40 hours of work assignments within the Costume Shop & a crew assignment of 35 hours for the summer's Devised AI Project. The Instructor will, in collaboration with each student, establish a schedule of when the 40 hours of work assignment will be completed based on a timeline of production and Costume Shop needs.

Expectations and Goals

- Arrive to class on time with a positive attitude and be prepared to work!
- Be open to guidance and instruction while working to complete assigned tasks. While the Costume Shop does not always have the same atmosphere as a classroom, we ask that you view it as a working learning environment and treat it accordingly.



- Students must wear <u>closed toe shoes</u> and <u>full coverage tops</u> for safety purposes. You must also wear closed toe shoes and full coverage tops while working in ANY of the costume areas. If you arrive to class without the appropriate attire you will be asked to leave and you will not receive credit for time not worked.
- You should <u>not</u> wear heavy perfume or fragrance while working in the costume shop. Strong scents may cause irritation and headaches for others working around you.
- All personal belongings like backpacks, purses, lunchboxes, drinks, and snacks should be stored in the designated cubby storage area. Please be sure not to leave any items on the floor in front of the storage area blocking walkways.
- The costume shop is a learning environment just like any other classroom. Cell phone
 ringers should be set on vibrate while in the costume shop. If you need to answer a call or
 message urgently, be courteous and communicate your needs with the Costume Shop Staff.
- There may be times when it is applicable to listen to music on a mobile device. Please ask the Costume Shop Manager before plugging in those air buds. If you receive permission to proceed with music only 1 ear please! It's important to still be able to hear and communicate with others around you.
- Personal videos or movies should not be viewed during class time.
- Interactions and conversations are important while learning but should not create distractions or interfere with your ability to complete assigned projects.

Summer Repertory Theatre Production Description

Devised Al Project -- Runs July 18-21

• Working with a team of student performers, designers, stage managers, and production teams, this project delves into methods of utilizing artificial intelligence in devised storytelling. Assistant Professor Heidi Boisvert and Visiting Research Assistant Professor Braxton Rae will guide students through this research and development process investigating: What do you need right now? This is a simple yet loaded question. With an ever-changing world filled with pandemics, doomscrolling, hostile political climates and more, we are becoming exceedingly isolated from one another. In this devised project featuring A.I. tools and techniques we explore using generative art as a creative force for healing and change. Art by itself may not be able to heal the world, but it can heal people. And those people can change the world.





minutes in length. Material will be developed through a highly interactive and collaborative studio incubator process. The project and process is directed/facilitated by SoTD faculty Manuel Simons and will culminate in a public showing.

Attendance & Grades

Attendance Policy, Class Expectations, and Make-Up Policy

Success in this course is based on participation, and other students are often dependent upon you to successfully do their work. Attendance is vital. In addition to meeting the total hours requirement for this course, it is important that you show up for both production crew call times and scheduled costume shop hours.

The Instructor will establish your schedule with your for the 40 hours of costume shop work time. Changes to your schedule should be discussed with your area supervisor in advance.

Your first unexcused absence is permitted without penalty. The second unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 5%. The third unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 15%. The fourth unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 30%. Two (2) late arrivals and/or early departures to/from class will count as one (1) absence. Excused absences are consistent with university policies in the undergraduate catalog.

Any absence from class for the following reasons must be supported by appropriate documentation to avoid a grade penalty:

Making up unexcused absences cannot be accommodated by the costume shop.
