COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is a forum in which undergraduates from any academic discipline at the University of Florida have the opportunity to develop a collaborative interdisciplinary research project. Specifically, this course focuses on university-level research conducted with and on digital games. Students will receive practical, theoretical, and methodological introductions to research practice during two-hour classroom sessions. Some of the sessions will focus on emerging theoretical, methodological, and practical issues in research while others will provide supervised faculty research time.

PURPOSE OF COURSE: The purpose of this course is to help familiarize students with research techniques by exploring various contemporary game studies. Through these investigations, students will learn how to develop their own interdisciplinary digital research project.

COURSE GOALS AND/OR OBJECTIVES: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Acquire hands-on research experience with a Digital Arts and Sciences research faculty
- ➤ Obtain an enhanced mastery of research practices coupled with Digital Arts & Sciences techniques and perspectives.
- Articulate and explain the coupling of at least one area of scholarship with emergent practices in the Digital Arts & Sciences.
- Understand notable sets of research methods coupled within the Digital Arts and Sciences.
