SYLLABUS & POLICIES

<u>Course Description</u>: This course introduces graduate students to the discipline of historical musicology through an examination of approaches, methodologies, practices, and issues that have shaped the field from its origins to the present day. Assignments include discussions, reports, presentations, and a focused research paper on a related topic.

Required Course Materials:

- 1) Beard, David and Kenneth Gloag. *Musicology: The Key Concepts*. 2nd ed. London & NY: Routledge, 2016. Paperback. ISBN: 978-0-415-67968-8. The second edition is required for spring 2017.
- 2) Access to items on electronic and desk reserve at the AFA Library (Ares). Many items are available now and others will be added throughout the semester.
- 3) Regular attention paid to your ufl email account. Announcements will be sent out via the email class listserv.

Policies, Course Information, and Objectives/Goals:

Emphasis will be placed on discussion of readings (musicological journal and/or other articles, book chapters, and other materials). It is essential that students read all assigned material before each class and come prepared with questions and/or comments about them. Class meetings will consist of a combination of discussion, oral and written reports, and presentation of material. These assignments, along with the term paper assignment, are designed to sharpen students' critical thinking skills, to develop their confidence in expressing ideas, and to help them work toward achieving mastery of course subject matter. Late submissions of any portion of the term paper assignment will receive a reduction in grade to be assigned at instructor's discretion. Any changes to the syllabus, should they occur, will be announced in class and timely notice will be given. Final and draft versions of papers will be submitted to the instructor in hard copy and Turnitin.com (through E-Learning) as well.

<u>ATTENDANCE POLICY</u>: Attendance will be taken at each class session. Students are expected to be on time, present, prepared, and actively engaged for every session for the entire period. Excessive absences, tardiness, and lack of preparation will be noted and will affect the final grade. Specific criteria for make-up assignments will be distributed and reviewed in class.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT POLICY: Academic misconduct, or dishonesty, is unacceptable in any college course and will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of university policy. Papers for this class must represent new work. They must not be papers or parts of papers that students have submitted previously for a different class at UF or elsewhere. ON TOPICS, ASSIGNMENTS, AND MAJOR DUE DATES

The semester consists of 15 weeks (spring break is an unnumbered week). The first day of class is Wednesday January 4, which is week 1. Students will give oral and written presentations in class on a regular basis on topics to be assigned. The number of presentations per student, topics, guidelines, and schedule of due dates will be determined when enrollment is finalized. The schedule containing this information will be distributed and reviewed in class after enrollment is finalized. Timely notice will be given for all weekly assignment due dates. In addition to presentations, students will have weekly reading assignments with guidelines for discussion of the readings and will read related entries in Beard and Gloag, 2nd ed. (*Musicology: The Key Concepts*). Detailed guidelines on the paper assignment will be distributed and reviewed in class. Basics: students will submit a written proposal and receive approval of the topic or advice on its revision (week 10). The topic must be approved in advance. After approval, students will have a brief conference with the instructor to be scheduled at a mutually convenient time in order to receive guidance on the paper assignment (weeks 10 and 11). Optional drafts of papers are due in week 13 in hard copy and on E-Learning. Students will present their papers to classmates at the end of the semester (week 14 or 15, TBD). Final papers are due on E-Learning and to instructor's mailbox in the School of Music Office time and date stamped by 4:00 p.m. on Monday of Finals Week. No late submissions will be accepted.
