Course Description

Music Theory 1 is the first course in a sequence of courses that develop skills and understanding of written music theory. Students will learn skills including writing and identifying scales, keys, chord progressions, basic form and analysis, as well as species counterpoint. The course will conclude with students learning the rules and procedures for writing proper four voice chorales.
