<u>Purpose of Course:</u> The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the practical components of writing for the band and orchestra mediums. Students will study scores while simultaneously listening to the music to identify how a composer is achieving a particular sound. Students will also engage with the rigorous nature of preparing a score and parts, from notation to print. Students will also read academic writings discussing both composition and orchestration.

<u>Course Goals and/or Objectives:</u> By the end of this course, students will be able to explain characteristics of well crafted orchestra and band scoring.

Course Policies:

<u>Attendance Policy:</u> Attendance for each class is mandatory. Should a student have prior knowledge that s/he will be unable to attend a particular class, an email to the teacher is required. More than two absences will result in the lowering of course grade by one increment for each additional absence. Grading Policies and Assignments:

Piano Reduction Assignments: The purpose of these assignments are to have students work through a large score and create a piano reduction in order to analyze the composer's use of doublings and orchestration of harmony. Students will be assigned a composition for each reduction assignment. They will not be required to make a piano reduction of the entire composition. Students can make a reduction for one or two pianos for two, four, or eight hands.

Midterm Project: Will be determined in the beginning part of the semester to best fit the needs of the class

Final Project: Will be determined in the beginning part of the semester to best fit the needs of the class.

Student Presentations: Students will choose an orchestra/wind ensemble work from the 20th or 21st century and present the work during class.

Participation: Specific readings/compositions will be assigned for required reading/listening. Students must read/listen to the assigned articles/compositions and be prepared to participate in class discussion.
