### **Course Description and Goals**

This advanced course is structured to support individual and collaborative project development by every student on the course. Students will create a "major" project over the course of the semester with regular intervals of critiques and reviews scheduled to support the development of your topic through research, technical skills, and exhibition creation

Students will present completed, original, individually or collaboratively authored work in group critiques and must be active in discussion of their own work and the work of their student peers. Students will participate in no fewer than three work in progress discussions with their peers.

#### **Grading Policies:**

Percentages of the semester average are given with each assignment, for example (10%) is ten percent of the semester average. The total of all assignments on the schedule is 100%.

Each grade is assigned based on A: class and group participation, B: on-time completion of all assigned materials and methods, C: continued development of each project step and summary towards the completion of the project based on feedback from the instructor, ie following up recommendations for research and project materials., D: each assignment's clarity, material specificity, and method.

#### Missing Critiques/ Make-Up Policy:

Group critiques cannot be rescheduled. There will be no opportunity to make-up discussions that are missed, nor any presentation that is missed during class-time.

#### Class Demeanor Policy:
