#### **PURPOSES AND GOALS**

This course will trace the historical development of hymns in liturgical use, the scope of hymnic literature, and the major trends in hymnal compilation and editing. Course topics will include a survey of Western hymnody from its Latin roots to the contemporary American hymn. In addition, the course will compare and contrast all major denominational hymnals.

### **ATTENDANCE**

## **NOTEBOOK**

At the time of the final exam, the student will be required to turn in a course notebook. This notebook should contain notes from all lectures, handouts, definitions, annotated bibliographies, etc. The format of the notebook is left up to the student, however, the purpose of the notebook is to serve as a resource for the future. Don't forget to list websites references and other pertinent information gained throughout the semester. The notebook must contain an outline of the history of hymnody.

## **PAPER**

Each student will be required to submit one written analysis project. The paper will consist of 2500-3000 words. The paper may cover any topic relevant to the course. Topics might include an in-depth analysis of the hymns of a particular composer, the texts of a representative poet, a major trend in hymnody, etc.

## **CLASS PARTICIPATION**

This course will be taught in a seminar format. Each participant will be responsible for preparing specific topic discussions for weekly class meetings. Throughout the semester, each class member will present an ongoing analysis of their chosen representative hymnal(s).

#### **HYMNAL ANALYSIS**

At the conclusion of the semester, each student will prepare a written analysis of their chosen hymnal. The analysis should include an historical survey of poetic texts and hymn tunes. The analysis will most likely be in an outline format. During the last week of classes each student will a summary of their findings with colleagues.

#### **EXAMS**
