<u>Course Description:</u> A seminar course in Tennessee Williams. The course will first review the popular work of Tennessee Williams, then quickly move into his lesser-known full-length plays, one-acts, and short stories.

Course Objectives:

- -Develop a familiarity with popular and lesser known works of Tennessee Williams
- -Develop a familiarity with SynthAnalysis
- -Create a dramaturgical guide for one of Tennessee Williams's full-length plays

Course Requirements:

Notes: All students are expected to take daily notes as well as notes on their work in class and observation notes of their colleagues.

- Play Logs: All students will keep a log of all full-length plays and one-acts. The logs will include a basic summary of the scenario, recurring images and themes, and statements that link the daily discussions to the play in question. Note date written and date first produced.
- Research Paper--A well researched, well written project. This is a 2-part assignment. You must have a well-constructed argument and introduction paragraph prepared approximately 4 weeks in advance of the submission of the final draft. Minimum 3 pages in length, double-spaced, 10 or 12 point Times or Calibri Font, MLA style citations.
- TW Dramaturgy Assignment— Students will select a full-length play (subject to approval). The student will create a dramaturgical resource of the play to include (but not limited to) glossary, research of themes, research of one-acts and short-stories that influenced the play, research of recurring or impactful images, research of given circumstances, research of characters.
- Final Presentation Each student will have equal responsibility for the final hour-long presentation of the class. The presentation will be an actualized aspect of a TW play.
- "Play It Forward": Students must join the facebook group "Play It Forward".

 Each student will invite a minimum of 2 people to the theatre who don't normally attend live theatre productions. Their night at the theatre must be documented and posted on "Play It Forward" by the final day of classes. Be sure THEY make a comment about the production & include your name so you can get credit. Also post a photo of you & your pal at the theatre. This assignment is to introduce NEW people to live theatre; don't cheat on this assignment by bringing people who regularly see you in your production work.
- Rehearsal for Presentations: Students are expected to prepare and rehearse scenes/monologues/presentations outside of class for in-class evaluation. Required Viewing: *Spill, Honky, Dance 2015, House of Atreus, BFA Dance Showcase*

Class Policies

Attendance: This is an experiential class. You are expected to be in class daily and to be on time. You are allowed **two absences with no penalty, each subsequent absence will result in a penalty of a full letter grade from your final grade per absence**. If you must miss a class meeting for any reason you must notify the instructor and your scene partner <u>prior to the missed class</u>, this does not "excuse" your absence this is simple professional courtesy. Three tardies equal 1 absence.

Make-Up Work: Late written work will not be accepted. In the event that an absence is known in advance, you must make arrangements to present the work early.

Written Work: All papers and assignments must be typed and handed in on time. Late assignments and papers will not be accepted. Students will accept a zero (0) for incomplete assignments and assignments that are not turned-in on the assigned date. Papers will be written in 12 point Times or Calibri font using double spacing. The instructor will not read papers that are late or that do not adhere to font size and spacing requirements. Pay close attention to minimum and maximum page length.

Any student who destroys the "safety zone" of the classroom will be asked to reconsider their choice to take this class.

Food and drinks (except water) are not permitted in class. No gum.

Cell phones/electronic devices: Silence or Turn off all cell phones and electronic devices. Do NOT leave them on vibrate. **If your cell phone rings in class be prepared to accept a mark of "tardy" for the day**. Three tardies equal 1 absence.

Research Assignment

A comprehensive well-researched, well-written paper detailing an aspect of Tennessee Williams's plays.

Structure: This must be a well-written paper with <u>a clear introduction including main points to be addressed in the body of the paper</u>. All stated main points make up the body of the paper and must be supported by evidence, testimony, comparisons, etc. Transition statements from paragraph to paragraph will help the document flow well. All papers must include <u>a concluding paragraph that restates the main points and closes with a thought-provoking statement</u>.

Format:

Minimum 2000 words, Maximum 2500 words (include word count of text)
Double-spaced
12 point Times or Calibri Font
Minimum 6 sources
MLA style parenthetical citations.
Annotated bibliography

(An annotated bibliography contains descriptive or evaluative comments on the sources)

Argument/Introduction paragraph – You will submit for peer and instructor review, a draft of your argument approximately 4 weeks prior to the research submission deadline.
