Course Objectives

- Building on the success of Lighting Design 1, further refine and develop the technical skills necessary to effectively manipulate theatrical and mainstream lighting equipment.
- Develop an understanding of how elements of design apply to theatrical lighting.
- Develop an aesthetic language for lighting and design

Attendance and Class Participation

Attendance for Lighting Design is mandatory. The course is based in practical application. You will not be able to learn the information presented in this course from the textbook alone. You are allowed 2 unexcused absences. After the second absence, your grade will be reduced by one full letter grade for each absence.

Critiques

You are required to see all performances produced by the School of Theatre and Dance during the spring semester and write a detailed critique of the lighting design for each. I challenge you to focus specifically on how the design enhances the story being told by the creative team. What were the strengths and weaknesses of this particular design? Be prepared to discuss things that you may have done differently and defend your decisions. Each critique is due the class meeting following the close of the production. Please be prepared to discuss your critique in class.

Exercises

These projects are small, homework based projects that are designed to demonstrate your research and comprehension skills. There will be a total of 4 exercises over the course of the semester. The project is intended to have you integrate concepts and ideas discussed in class into your physical work.

Projects

The course will be heavily project based. The first project will focus on process and paperwork. The second will focus on design and aesthetic. The final will incorporate all elements of the course work to present a cohesive and solid conceptual lighting design project for a script of your choice. You must submit your script for approval by the instructor no later than February 25.
