Electracy is a theory by Gregory Ulmer that describes the kind of skills and facility necessary to exploit the full communicative potential of new electronic media such as multimedia, hypermedia, social software, and virtual worlds. According to Ulmer, *electracy* "is to digital media what literacy is to print.".. (Wikipedia)

DESCRIPTION

This junior-level studio design course focuses on the integration and further use of contemporary technology in your art practice. You will be allowed to design utilizing rapid prototyping for object creation as well as design for physical object packaging and web applications. Our primary goal is to become adept at utilizing current available technologies to design and create in order to better extend our reach to various societies in an efficient and robust manner. The course includes technical demos and talks, frequent design feedback, exercises and three major projects. Project One introduces the semester with the production of a 3d model and a printed prototype based on research from one of the over 1000 UNESCO world heritage sites. Throughout projects 2 and 3, you will work on the integration of package design and website creation into the UNESCO project. The end of the course will culminate with a class presentation of fully developed and executed electrate objects/ideas.

GRADING AND EVALUATION

Each project is 30 points – achieved by meeting intermediate deadlines as well as making final project presentations. Most of the project points come from simply meeting the upload deadlines and participating in the online/in-class feedback sessions. Some project points come from an instructor evaluation of concept, form and craft. Specific grading criteria will be listed on each assignment sheet. There are two in-class exercises during the semester, five points each. The projects and exercises add up to a total of 100 points. After intermediate feedback and final presentations the design project/exercise points will be converted to a letter grade based on the standard UF 4.0 scale (including "minus" grades). In order to calculate a final letter grade, the three major projects will be averaged together equally. Projects will not be accepted after their due date without prior approval.

GRAPHIC DESIGN STUDIO NOTES

Be community-minded and collegial. Respect each other by listening to your music on headphones and by keeping your desk, row and the community areas clean. Recycle paper, cans, and reuse other materials.

Because of limited custodial services in the design studios, trash cans should be put out in the hallway every evening.

Do not use spray adhesive in the studios or in the building. A spray booth which may be used for aerosols is located on the 2nd floor of FAC.

Cell phones should be turned to vibrate during class times. If you must take a phone call — doing so in the hallway will minimize disruption.

Food and drink is allowed in the classroom. We ask that you be attentive to cleaning up and throwing away food remains — preferably in the hallway trash cans.

Access to individual classrooms, laboratories and the studio facilities is limited to those enrolled in the program. If you notice any strangers, feel free to question or report them.

Lab fees are used to supply the printers with ink and paper. Be conservative in your use of these materials.
