Joe Glover Scholarship for Excellence in Musical Theatre Established to Benefit Broadway Bound University of Florida Students

Gainesville, Fla., February 1, 2016 — University of Florida (UF) alumni are no strangers to Broadway. Recent graduates have toured nationally with shows such as *Here Lies the Love, Godspell, Mamma Mia!, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, West Side Story* and, most recently, in 42nd Street, which came to the Phillips Center in Gainesville, Florida, on Jan. 19, 2016. Now, thanks to the generous donation of UF Provost Dr. Joe Glover, musical theatre students at UF will have additional support as they pursue their dreams.

Following the 42nd Street performance in Gainesville, current musical theatre students gathered with Kaitlin Lawrence (BFA Musical Theatre '11), UF College of the Arts Dean Lucinda Lavelli, Dr. Glover, UF School of Theatre + Dance Director Jerry Dickey and Tony Mata, head of UF's Musical Theatre program, for the announcement of the creation of the Joe Glover Scholarship for Excellence in Musical Theatre. The endowed scholarship, which will be awarded for the first time at the end of the spring 2016 semester,



will provide annual undergraduate support for a musical theatre student.

"The students in this program are world-class," said Dr. Glover. "It is a privilege to be able to recognize their accomplishments and to help inspire them to pursue their dreams as they launch their careers. The Musical Theatre program is a gem, and these students add to the rich cultural life on the campus."

UF's School of Theatre + Dance currently offers a BFA in Musical Theatre. The program joins forces with UF's School of Music and a world-class diverse faculty to give its students one of the most challenging artistic and academic training opportunities in the country. The program aims to develop highly skilled "triple threat" performers with skills and talents in acting, singing and dance to ensure job opportunities upon graduation. In addition to appearances on Broadway, UF musical theatre alumni have performed Off-Broadway, in national tours, in regional theatres, in film and on television. Recent UF performances have included *The Drowsy Chaperone, Sweeney Todd, Guys and Dolls, Chicago* and *West Side Story.*
