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Course Description

In this three credit course, students from a variety of disciplines will immerse themselves in the exciting world of Applied Theatre for education, community development and social change. Through course readings, case studies, exercises and discussions, students will develop their own applied theatre practice and performance opportunities. By investigating the work of revolutionary artists such as Brecht, Freire, and Boal, as well as contemporary Applied Theatre practitioners, we will develop an understanding of how theatre can become a catalyst for change. With a focus on sexual assault education on the UF campus, students will take part in numerous performances of *Ashley's Consent*, a multi-media Applied Theatre play, as well as devising and performing their own work for the UF community. Students will also have the opportunity to work with organizations off campus and develop lasting partnerships within the Gainesville community. Students from all disciplines are welcome; no prior theatre experience is necessary.

Course Objectives

At the end of this course students will:

- have a broad understanding of Applied Theater theory, history and impact.
- be able to apply this knowledge in the creation and performance of their own work.
- have formed a partnership with an organization.

Course Format

Students will meet on T/TH for 100 minutes for discussions, rehearsals, and performances. Students will be expected to rehearse outside of class time and complete weekly reading assignments for class discussion. Students will devise and perform work monthly based on our discussions and theoretical readings. Students will be encouraged to explore their own areas of interest and create work that is important to them. The active participation of all students is required with a consistent mindfulness of maintaining safety, confidentiality, openness and mutual respect for all participants.

Assignments

1. Journal: Students will generate and reflect on a weekly writing prompt/question

as well as collect 1 relevant newspaper/magazine article (from a newspaper or online source) and 1 image (from any source) per week. The intention of this exercise is to develop an image and topic resource to be used in projects. This journal will be handed in and returned.

2. Presentation 1: In small groups students will give a 20 minute presentation on an element of Brecht's effect on applied theater, ie: how has Brecht influenced social theater? What are Brechtian techniques and how do they work? In consultation with the course instructors, students will choose a play which exemplifies Brechtian technique on which to base their presentation.

3. Image Theatre Presentation: Students will generate and perform Image theater. This piece can take the form of a live performance in Turlington Plaza/Plaza of the Americas or could be photographed/videoed and posted on social media (or all of the above).

4. Invisible Theatre Presentation: In small groups students will devise and perform short/invisible theater scenes around campus. These scenes can take place in Turlington, the Hub, on buses, at bus stops, in lines, etc. around the UF campus.

5. Me Too Monologue Presentation: Students will seek submissions from the public of anonymous stories of sexual assault. Students will then create monologues based on the submissions and perform them. These may also be video recorded.

6. Final Project Presentation: In collaboration with the instructors, students will devise and perform a final project. Students will have their choice of 2 options.

- Students will interview rehab patients at Shands Rehab Hospital and create a piece of theater based on these interviews. This will be performed at Shands on Dec. 2 for the patients.
- Students will develop a video and accompanying curriculum for Florida Life Students. This will be a 10 minute video followed by 40 minute workshop/discussion questions.
- There may be specific circumstances under which students could propose a final project in consultation with the instructors. This decision will be made on a case by case basis.

- Proposal: Students will develop a 1-2 page proposal of the project:
- Who is the proposal for? What are the goals of the proposal? What forms will be utilized? Project timeline & Project rehearsals schedule.
- A final script of the project
- A short evaluation of the project due by Dec. 10 evaluating the successes and failures of the project.
