**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** An interdisciplinary overview of the technological and cultural developments that continue to shape the modern world. Student research covers topics including telecommunications, digital and analog technologies, video games, computer-generated entertainment and the rise of social media.

**PREREQUISITE KNOWLEDGE & SKILLS:** Admission to BA in DAS or Consent of Instructor.

**PURPOSE OF COURSE:** The focus of this course is on the ever-expanding array of relationships that constitute digital culture – international social and cultural practices, business and marketplace structures, and emerging technological forms that have resulted from the multi-faceted developments of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.

**COURSE GOALS AND/OR OBJECTIVES:** By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1) Explain the impact and importance of pioneering individuals and cultural developments of the 20<sup>th</sup> and early 21<sup>st</sup> centuries
- 2) Analyze the interconnectedness of technology and culture from diverse sociotechnical perspectives
- 3) Compare and contrast how technology drives culture and vice versa
- 4) Design and develop a research presentation that gives an in-depth look at a historical development from at least two divergent perspectives
- 5) Interpret the ramifications of historical developments and prognosticate a future scenario wherein current technological and culture trends will have resulted in a significant change to a significant aspect of global culture

### COURSE SCHEDULE:

This course incorporates lecture, and discussion, group learning projects and student-created presentations. Individual assignments will be explained in detail as the course progresses.
