

SA+AH SlideRoom PDF Portfolio Guideline

Portfolios are *not*** required for admission but are reviewed for scholarship consideration. **


THINGS TO KNOW

- You can begin the SlideRoom portfolio application process and edit it several times before finally submitting by the deadline.
- It is *highly recommended* that you begin working in SlideRoom as soon as possible! (We find that many questions about the portfolio process will be answered for you within the SlideRoom form.)
- We ask you to submit a .PDF file with no more than 10 pages/slides of your best work demonstrating your creativity, skill, and thinking process as an artist and/or designer. In the "description," please include any brief notes you want us to know about the project.
- Work, imagery, and/or concept influenced by or originating from another source (i.e. Google, Instagram, another artist, etc.) must be notated in the description box provided; failure to cite sources and/or influences of work may be considered plagiarism.
- Your PDF file should be **10MB max.**

PORFOLIO TIPS

- Select the projects that best represent you as an artist, as well as your skill and experience.
- Range and diversity are great! But do not feel pressured to include projects in other mediums that is not your best.
- The portfolio should include work that you believe is relevant to how you express yourself as an artist. Avoid overly commercial approaches to work in your portfolio (ex: wedding or product photography, fan art commissions, etc.)
- The work should be organized and show the emergence of a creative vision and theme.
- There is *no formula* for the *right portfolio*. (Always strive to submit your best work!)
- Quality documentation is important; images should be in focus, cropped, well lit, represent colors accurately, without shadow or glare, etc.
- Consider showing multiple views for three-dimensional works.
- We ask for *no more than* 10 slides/pages on your document, which in most cases should feature one project/image per slide. Some works may use an additional slide to show the process or a few smaller detail images, but this will count towards the total.
- Here are examples of how you might present multiple views/ or images of a related work together so it counts as one larger "image" on a slide:

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Note: This combination of images on a slide/page should not be done to increase the total number of projects in the document but can be used to show a process or for that work from a series/multiples.

- Use a program of your choice to create your PDF portfolio. Some possible choices are:
 - **Google Slides/Microsoft PowerPoint** – Create a slideshow with images, descriptions and links, then export the slideshow as a PDF file
 - **Google Docs/Microsoft Word** – Create a document with images, descriptions and links, then export the document as a PDF file
 - **Adobe Creative Suite, Canva**

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HOW TO SET UP YOUR MEDIA/PORTFOLIO SUBMISSION AS A **PDF**: THE BASICS

To streamline the review process, you will be uploading ONE (1) PDF that includes ALL projects you are submitting for your portfolio. You will need to produce documentation of each project (e.g. still images, audio/visual hosting links) on a page/slide along with a brief description all combined into one PDF file (max file size: 10MB).

- Basic Requirements for your PDF Portfolio

Number of pages/slides: **10 MAXIMUM.**

Generally speaking, one (1) page/slide = one (1) project/artwork. You may choose to use a second page/slide for detail images or to show the process of the same artwork, but this will count towards the 10-page maximum.

- The portfolio should depict the best possible representation of your creative work and should demonstrate the following:
 - Creativity
 - Imagination and innovation
 - Development of idea and concepts
 - Visual organization
 - Craft and technical competence
- We recommend showing a range of work, so consider projects from all the courses you have taken.
- Submit no more than 10 pages/slides in the file. *
 - *If appropriate, include additional detail images of a work (this will count towards your maximum page/slide count if on a second page/slide, or it can be combined into one page/slide as a collage).
- Each piece should indicate the dimensions of the piece, media used, date created and should also include a written description of the work and concept (descriptions should be no longer than 50 words). See examples in the guide below.

How to label your slides/pages!

- **Image of the work**
- **Title of the work**
- **Important details such as the materials/medium, dimensions, and date completed (Links can also go here)**
- **Brief description of the work. This should be a maximum of 50 words.**
