course description	This course emphasizes design thinking methodologies and visual theories in order to create an understanding of how these tools can begin to inform the design process as a whole. Students will be introduced to and employ principles of design to explore complex problems and systems. This course will expand upon relationships between: content and meaning, problem and solution, ideation and iteration.		
course objectives	By the end of this course, students should be able to: –effectively manipulate the principles of design –create different types of compositions (representational, abstract, objective, non-objective, etc) –develop cohesive concepts using a variety of problem-solving strategies –speak and write critically about personal and peer works and propose alternatives –research an idea and develop an extended series of related images/visual information

sketchbook	This is a collection of your progress both in and out of class. You are encouraged to record any- thing you find interesting in your sketchbook. These entries can include sketches, photographs, interesting places, designers, thoughts, ideas, process, typography examples, etc. This sketchbook will help you to build ideas, and revisit past ideas. Please make sure to have a separate sketch- book for this class, as they will be collected after each project as part of your grade.

Project grades will be evaluated based on concept (including process sketches/notebook), solution, participation, and craft.

Participation is evaluated based on many criteria such as attendance, completing homework assignments, contributing constructive and helpful feedback during critiques, discussing research and readings, meeting class deadlines, and acting in a professional manner.

Grades will only be rounded to the next full point. For example, an 89.4 or below is a B+ and will not be rounded to an A. An 89.5 or above will be rounded to a 90 (an A).

late work & makeup Missing class does not constitute an extension of an assignment. Missing critique of an assignment results in the assignment being graded at 70% of its original grade. If a student is late to critique, that student's project grade will be reduced by half a letter grade.

*Late work will only be accepted if contact was made with instructor prior to or on the due date

If the reason for lateness falls under excused absences (illness with doctor's note, death in family, religious holiday, university sponsored trips), there will be no penalty as long as the work is completed by the new agreed-upon date. If the reason is an unexcused one, or the agreed-upon date is missed, one letter grade will be taken off for each day it is late.

An assignment more than 3 days late will receive an E. If no contact with instructor was made, late work will not be accepted. Makeup critiques will not be given.
