Course Description

The relationship, deliberate and subconscious, formal and conceptual, between Byzantine icons and modern art has recently been of renewed interest to art historians. This class will examine the icon as idea and as object in the longue durée from antiquity to the 20th century. We will also consider historical and contemporary periods and acts of iconoclasm.

Course Objectives

-To gain familiarity with the philosophical, theological, and art historical discourse surrounding icons in the western tradition.

-To gain familiarity with key media, motifs, techniques and compositions related to icons

-To gain familiarity with historical and contemporary episodes of iconoclasm

-To apply, orally and in writing, art historical and philosophical frameworks of analysis to the content of the course
