Course Description and Objectives

This course is an introductory survey of major artistic trends in Asia. We will be focusing on those of India, China, and Japan while also paying attention to other artistic developments in South, East, Southeast, West, and Central Asia. We will discuss important developments in style and subject matter, with major monuments of the arts of these three cultures as primary evidence. The course will be divided into three discrete sections: the arts of India, China, and Japan. Although these three Asian countries engaged in extensive cultural interchanges during the periods of time covered by this course, each region developed its own artistic styles and forms. The student will be expected to understand the major issues of the art of each culture and to discuss both the mutual influences and the many cultural and artistic differences between the three cultural traditions.

Course Format and Requirements

The class will be conducted as a series of slide-illustrated lectures. The student is responsible for taking three unit exams, and doing assigned readings in the textbook (see weekly schedule). Since much of the material presented in lectures cannot be readily obtained outside the classroom, your attendance in lecture is essential.

Examinations and Grades

There will be three unit exams. The format for all three exams will be essentially the same, and it will insist of term definitions, slide identification, slide comparison/contrast, and short essay questions. Although the exams will not be comprehensive you will need to have an understanding of previous material to do well on the successive exams. Most of material for the exams will be taken from class lectures and readings. The works for which you will be responsible can be found in the three books. We will provide slide lists of specific works and special terminologies for which you are responsible on the exams.
