# **MUH 2501: Introduction to World Music (Online)**

## **Course Description**

This course functions as an online survey of world musical traditions and as an introduction to thinking about and listening to these traditions in their respective cultural settings. As such, it serves as an introduction to ethnomusicology, which is the study of music in its cultural context. *Musical training is not* a *prerequisite for enrollment in this class*.

This is a fully online course, designed to give students a great deal of flexibility. It is the student's responsibility to:

- 1. Carefully read the syllabus.
- 2. Stay current with all assignments, and class-wide announcements.

### **Required Textbook and Materials**

- Required Text: World Music: Traditions and Transformations
  by Michael B. Bakan (McGraw-Hill, 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, 2012. ISBN-100073526649 (available at the University book store).
- Required CDs: Listening set for World Music: Traditions and Transformations by Michael B. Bakan (McGraw-Hill, 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, 2012) (Available online and at bookstore)

Listening assignments make up a large part of your class work, so it is crucial that you have access to all textual and recorded material. Getting a good grade in this class will depend on it.

The text and recordings are available two ways:

1. You can purchase or rent the text and CDs (either from the bookstore or internet source)

Or:

2. You can purchase the online version through McGraw Hill "Connect" (See the announcement on how to do this in the "Announcements tab). This is cheaper than buying the physical text and some students find it more convenient. If you do not have access to a CD player, this will give you access to all of the recorded material in mp3 form along with access to the textbook online.

# **Course Objectives**

In this course, you will:

- Develop a conceptual understanding of different types of "world" music, as you read about and listen to different musical styles from around the world.
- Develop the ability to identify and describe the basic stylistic elements that makes each music unique.
- Develop basic familiarity with musical terminology and learn to use it to describe and discuss what you hear.
- Identify some of the cultural and social factors that have contributed to the formation of these musical styles.

### **Course Overview**

This course will be conducted entirely on-line using "Canvas," UF's e-learning course platform. Assignments and quizzes are divided into weekly learning modules that correspond to the textbook chapters. Each module will focus on either a set of analytical tools (such as musical terminology), a musical style, or family of styles. Modules are thematic, which means that each will draw on a variety of analytical and cultural lenses (such as politics, identity, or spirituality) to provide a context for the music you will be studying. Each module will be a specific case study that focuses on a different part of the world. Modules may draw from the following materials:

- Assigned textbook readings.
- Assigned course listening material.
- Weekly power point presentation readings.
- You Tube videos (in some cases).

### **Course Policies**

**Attendance:** Since this is an online course, this refers to:

- The student's attention to the syllabus.
- The student's observation of all assignment deadlines.
- The student's attention and awareness of all class communication through Canvas.

The student's preparedness for all assignments and examinations.

# Save each week's readings:

In order to ensure that everyone in the class stays on schedule, module assignments, tests and quizzes will close immediately after each week. It will be therefore important for you to save each weeks readings so that you may use them to study for exams.

Remember, assignments, readings and examinations will close each week. Please keep this in mind as you progress through the coursework and budget your time wisely.

### Course Calendar

This is a completely online course. It is your responsibility as a student to be motivated and keep pace with assignments each week, Monday through Sunday. Each Learning Module is slightly different, with combinations of readings, listening examples, video examples, and other web resources. Learning Modules #3, 6, 9, 12, 15 each contain a unit test. Every single Learning Module has a discussion assignment and a quiz. Please view the Course Schedule for more detailed information. The site is set up in such a manner that

Learning Modules will begin every Friday at 12 a.m. and end every Friday at 11 p.m. EST.

### Course Material

Please note: As you review this section, it might be easier to do so with the class website open:

### 1) Course Schedule:

 Located on the course homepage, the Course Schedule lists the dates for all the reading assignments, listening assignments, exams, and other course activities for the entire term. It is vital that you monitor this on a weekly basis as this schedule is subject to change.

## 2) Texts and Material:

- In addition to the required text book and accompanying 4-CD pack (listed above) texts and other material are uploaded under "lessons" on Canvas/E-Learning. Active musical listening is an important part of the course and a core skill that you will need to develop throughout the term. We will discuss music regularly, so it is important that you listen to the appropriate excerpts in advance.
  - IF YOU ARE USING THE ONLINE BOOK AND AUDIO: you must access them through the McGraw-Hill Connect tab to the left. You will not be able to access them any other way.
- All necessary listening material is available on the CDs that accompany the book.
   You should take advantage of the "listening guide" boxes in the textbook (e.g., p. 141-142) to guide your listening outside of class. Any further listening examples will be available via Canvas.
- Again you may purchase an online option for both the text and listening material through Mcgraw Hill "Connect." (See the announcement on how to do this).
- There will also be study guides for the tests and guidelines posted online for each assignment.

# 3) Learning Modules:

This course proceeds through the semester weekly (opens Friday @ 12am through due dates on Fridays @ 11pm EST). Learning Modules, include reading assignments, listening examples, video lectures, discussion assignments, quizzes, or various other items when appropriate. All the material is provided within each module.

# 4) Quizzes:

Quizzes are located under the "Assessments" tab on the left side of the class website.

- Quizzes will be given for Learning Modules 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 13, & 14. These will summarize important points from the Learning Modules.
- The quizzes are always "open book," meaning that you are encouraged to refer back to the week's material as needed to complete the quiz.
- The quizzes are timed, and once you answer a question, you cannot go back so take your time and choose your answer carefully.
- Each quiz will only be available for the dates corresponding to its respective weekly lesson.

## 5) Essay Assignments:

- Essay assignments are located under the "Assignments" tab on the left side of the class website.
- Each essay assignment contains a writing prompt that asks you to reflect upon a number of aspects from the Learning Module material.
- "Yes," "no," one and two sentence answers are not acceptable.
- Important: You must use the book and audio material exclusively when composing your essay responses. The use of external websites is not allowed. Essays that do use external sources like Wikipedia or will be given an automatic 0.
- Remember your job is to synthesize the assigned material and come up with your own answer to the prompt. Your essays must be in your own words and stay within the word count range for each individual assignment. Paraphrasing is prefered, but should you need to quote something from the book, a simple name and page number will do: (Bakan 35).
- Essays made up of excessive strings of "dumped" or unjustified quotations will be given a 0.
- You will not need to provide a bibliography, since you will only be using the text and recordings to compose your essays.
- Important: All submissions are automatically evaluated using "Turn-It-In" plagiarism checking software on Canvas. This program instantly compares student essays with everything on the web in addition to everything that ever been submitted using Turn-It-In. A Turn it in score of 40% or higher will automatically be assigned a 0.
- For the writing assignments in this class it is assumed that you are familiar with standard American usage, grammar, and basic writing skills; if you need assistance with writing issues, you are encouraged to contact the Writing Studio, where free assistance is available (http://writing.ufl.edu/writing-studio(Links to an external

- <u>site.)Links to an external site.</u> and <a href="http://writing.ufl.edu/writing-studio/hours-andlocation">http://writing.ufl.edu/writing-studio/hours-andlocation</a> (Links to an external site.)Links to an external site.).
- Each essay assignment will only be available for the dates corresponding to its respective Learning Module.
- A missed essay assignment equals a grade of zero. Once discussions close, they will not be reopened. Please plan accordingly.
- Each essay assignment will be graded out of a grading rubric of 10 points. The criteria are as follows:
  - Exemplary (9-10 points): Addresses all elements of the question thoroughly and accurately within allotted word count minimums and connects ideas in logical manner. Uses acceptable style and grammar. 1 to No errors.
  - Quality (7-8 points): Addresses all of the above elements, though not as thoroughly (1-2 spelling and/or grammatical errors)
  - Adequate: Does not address the question explicitly, but does so tangentially.
     Answer does not meet minimum word count requirement. Answer connects ideas in a minimal way. Uses adequate style and grammar (more than 4 errors).
  - Needs Improvement (3 points): Does not address the question. Answer is not clearly or logically organized and fails to use acceptable style and grammar. Answer falls significantly short of world count requirement.
  - No Response (0 points)

# 6) Tests:

There will be five tests – Learning Module # 3, 6, 9, 12 and 15. Please look at the course and plan accordingly. The tests will be timed, "closed-book" tests. You will have 30 minutes to finish and you can go back and forth through the questions before you submit the full exam. Tests may contain multiple choice, matching, map identification, instrument identification, true-false, fill-in-the blanks, short answer, essay, listening questions, and possibly other style of questions. They are not cumulative. There are no make-ups for tests, so please be of deadlines (make-ups will only be given in emergency circumstances). Be sure you are able to recognize listening examples from the Learning Modules, as well as answer questions about concepts related to the listening examples as covered in readings, videos, and other web. Material for the tests may be partially drawn from quizzes.

# Deadlines and Important Dates:

- Assignments must be turned in on time (remember BEFORE the due date—if you
  try to submit assignments at the last minute, you risk difficulties or missing the
  deadline).
- Please note that all due dates are times based in Gainesville, Florida, which is Eastern Standard Time- EST! Please keep this in mind if you are out of state or in another time zone.
- Failure to submit assignments properly on Canvas will result in a zero for the assignment.
  - Please double check that your items are submitted, because this is not a valid excuse for not turning in assignments on time.

- Having no internet or Wi-Fi, or computer access is not a valid excuse. Waiting to the last minute and missing a deadline due to technical issues is also not a valid excuse.
- Be advised that Canvas can go down for upgrades and maintenance, so don't get caught in a bind – plan ahead and work ahead of schedule.

- Complete the weekly 300-500 word written response using the subject prompt.
- Take quiz or test that corresponds to the module you are working with by its due date in the course calendar by 11:59 PM.

- Late work will not be accepted without exception.
- Missed guizzes and tests may not be made up.
