ART 2500c: Painting: Investigations in Black and White

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course investigates the visual language of painting through a comprehensive study of lights and darks. The course helps students develop strategies for constructing rich value systems with paint. Throughout the semester we will explore many different methods of paint application and composition.

OBJECTIVES

The main objective of this course is for students to become familiar with handling paint to create dynamic value structures and compositions. You will employ a variety of techniques to expand upon your visual language. Critique sessions will continue to develop your abilities to talk about your work and ideas. You will also be expected to apply critical insight to the work of your colleagues.

UNITS OF STUDY — 1st half of semester

Value Scale Studies and Self Portrait

Criteria are:

- use of wide range of value
- craftmanship
- · accurate use of value
- use of paint & touch
- 2. Notan is a Japanese convention that has had a great influence on modern painting in the western world. The notan system balances light and dark shapes into interactive wholes that seem both fixed and dynamic at the same time.

Figure-Ground: Studies in black & white cut paper will introduce the idea of the 'expanded square'. The best of these studies will be selected as a model for a painting which demonstrates an understanding of the notan elements.

Criteria are:

- use of figure-ground interchange
- use of shape interaction
- use of paint & touch
- · use of colorism in the effect of darks & lights
- Chiaroscuro is an Italian Renaissance idea that was codified in the 15th and 16th centuries and remains surprisingly
 relevant today. The chiaroscuro system defines the way light and shadows are depicted on a plane and on curved
 surfaces in space.

Forms & Light: Still-life studies, composition studies, and ultimately a fully developed painting which demonstrates an understanding of the chiaroscuro elements.

Criteria are:

- the logic of light & shadows
- use of the six (6) chiaroscuro elements
- use of paint & touch
- use of colorism in the effect of darks & lights

4. Field Painting is an American invention of the 20th century. Jackson Pollack was the most famous practitioner of this form. In field painting patterns move across the canvas in such a way as to dissolve individual shapes into coherent surface that is vivid and luminous. Synchronic Surface: Swatches of painting experiments combined with pattern drawing exercises will become source material for a painting which demonstrates an understanding of the principle elements of field painting.

Criteria are:

- coherence of surface effect
- sense of light & depth
- use of paint & touch
- · use of colorism in the effect of darks & lights.

MID-SEMESTER After demonstrating a competent understanding of the above techniques during the first half of the course, students will integrate individual ideas into painting projects of their own design during the second half of the course. Students will draft a contract (sheets attached at end of syllabus) for the professor proposing two separate painting projects. These projects must reflect elements learned during the first half of the semester, however, students are encouraged to create more personal and imaginative work. Students will be required to turn make a series of sketches and studies prior to beginning each painting. The two (2) projects can be worked on simultaneously or individually, but keep in mind that all paintings are DUE AT THE FINAL CRITIQUE

3. B+	Very good work: All criteria of assignment were surpassed, and studio practice was exceptional. Changes need to be made to make this work exceptional.

4. B	Very good work, above average: Understanding and clear potential. Most criteria of assignment were surpassed with some improvements to be made. Studio practice during the project was commendable.	
5. B-	Good work: Most criteria of assignment was met. Work showed promise with a few significant improvements to be made. Studio practice was commendable.	
6. C+	A bit above average: The works do not succeed as projected, yet effort was made. Studio practice needs to be improved.	
7. C	Average work: Meeting most of the assignment criteria with areas needing significant improvement. Poor studio practice overall.	
8. C-	Slightly below average work: Project meets some criteria but falls below the expectations of the assignment, partially as a result of poor studio practice.	
9. D+	Below average work. Barely meets the criteria, poor or unfinished work, highlighting poor studio practice.	
10. D	Significantly below average work. Barely meets the criteria, extremely poor or unfinished work, highlighting unacceptable studio practice. Work shows limited understanding and/or effort.

The studio is for your use outside of class time. You will be given the combination to the studio, it is for YOUR use only. Students are expected to follow studio guidelines at all times. All students are required to help during studio clean up at the end of the semester and it will count towards your participation grade.

PAINTING AND DRAWING AREA RULES

All users of the studio classrooms are expected to follow studio area rules at all times. If you have any questions, ask your instructor.

Glass with hazardous materials must be wrapped, labeled with a filled out yellow hazardous waste labels and placed in the blue bin at the SWMA. The trash guidelines are to ensure the safety of anyone encountering the trash. Liquids, medical waste, yard waste, appliances and pallets are prohibited from disposal in the dumpster.
- No eating, consumption of alcohol or smoking is permitted in the studios.
- Clean up after yourself- wipe down surfaces (easles, drawing boards, stools with a wet towel).
- Do not block doorways or block access to lights.
- Do not remove furniture from rooms or borrow furniture from rooms without permission from the area coordinators.
- Do not create "daisy chains" with multiple electric cords.
- · No hazardous materials down sinks.
- Store all flammables in the flammable cabinet. Keep flammable cabinet closed at all times.
- · Clean up after yourself.
- First aid kits are found in each studio. Notify your instructor if supplies are low.
- Report any safety issues IMMEDIATELY to your instructor.
- All courses must engage in an end of the semester clean up.
- Follow the SA+AH CONTAINER POLICY (see policy below) There are 2 types of labels used in the SA+AH-- yellow and white. Both labels are found at the red MSDS box and are supplied by the SA+AH. Each is used for a different purpose.

White: All new and or used product in containers (hazardous or what might be perceived as hazardous -i.e. watered-down gesso, graphite solutions, satellite containers of solvents, powders, spray paints, fixatives, oils, solvents, etc...) must be labeled within the SA+AH to identify their contents. Labels can be found at the MSDS box in each studio and work area.

All containers must be marked with your name, contents and date opened. All secondary/satellite containers for hazardous materials must be marked with content, your name and the date opened. All unmarked containers will be disposed of with no notice.

Yellow: WHEN HAZARDOUS ITEMS ARE DESIGNATED AS WASTE. All containers must have a yellow label identifying the contents that are designated as trash for weekly EHS pick up. - Flammable solid containers (red flip top) must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside (top). - 5 gallon jugs must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside. - Fibrous containers must have a yellow hazardous waste label on the outside (top). - Each item in the blue bin must have a yellow hazardous waste label.

Note: Hazardous Waste labels should include all constituents in the waste mixture as well as an approximate percentage of the total for that item and must add up to 100%. Labels should also include the Bldg and room number of the shop generating the waste along with the Waste Manager for your area, this is located on the SWMA sign posted at the sink or at the Waste Management Ares.

 - 2" or larger "house painting" brush for gesso application
- 9. 1- white synthetic brush set (various sizes)
- 10. Paint Acrylic: Ivory Black and Titanium White. (Do not purchase: Liquitex Basics or Craft acrylics).
 - Golden, Liquitex professional heavy body, Winsor & Newton, or Sennelier or comparable brands.
- 11. Oil: Ivory Black, Mars Black, Lamp Black, Paynes Gray, Titanium White
 - Winsor & Newton Winton Oil Colors, Gamblin 1980, or comparable brands
- 12. Pallet Knife Preferably a metal-tipped pallet knife for mixing paints.
- 13. 1- 2oz Sumi or india ink
- 14. Sketch Book All-purpose paper, 8x11in minimum
- 15. Pencils 2h, h, hb, b, 2b, 3b, 4b
- 16. Pencil Sharpener and eraser
- 17. PVA Adhesive (glue)
- 18. Scissors
- 19. X-acto knife
- 20. Black Construction Paper
- 21. Canvas Each student will receive 3 yards of canvas; you must provide any additional. It will be required that you stretch at least one canvas throughout the semester.
- 22. Containers- used glass jars with sealable lids. These will hold water and solvents.
