# **Course Description**

The Music in Medicine Capstone course is the culminating course in the Undergraduate Music in Medicine certificate. This course provides students an opportunity to undertake individual research related to the intersections between music and health. Literature review and a culminating research paper will deepen the student's understanding of music in medicine practice.

# **Objectives**

- 1. Survey and analyze literature as it relates to utilization of music in a healthcare or community setting
- 2. Recognize and articulate theoretical foundations that inform the practice of music in medicine
- 3. Explain the distinction between music in medicine and music therapy
- 4. Formulate a formal research paper

### **Course Format and Content**

The course uses an individual contractual format for specific academic requirements. The general scope and content is as follows:

- An in-depth, independent survey of the literature as it relates to the intersections between music and health
- Formulation of a research proposal and project on an approved topic related to music in healthcare or community settings
- Exploration of the distinction between music in medicine and music therapy
- Meet with course instructor a minimum of every other week
- Submit a final paper of 2500-3000 words undertaken in the context of current literature. See capstone contract for details.

### **Evaluation: 200 points**

- **Intro Paper:** 25 points
  - o Summarize the distinction between music in healthcare and music therapy
  - Use relevant literature
  - o 500 words minimum, 800 words maximum (including references)
- Capstone Proposal: 50 points
