Music Theory Review for Graduate Students

<u>Course Description:</u> A review of music theory, part-writing, analysis, ear-training and sight-singing, in preparation for graduate coursework in music theory. Topics covered include diatonic and chromatic part-writing, analysis, advanced chromatic harmony, and aural skills. The content in this review course will be roughly equivalent to that of a standard two-year undergraduate music theory sequence.

Course Requirements:

Students will complete all assigned readings, listenings, weekly assignments, and analysis projects on time. Exams will consist of written analyses and part-writing, listening, as well as harmonic dictation and sight-singing. Students are expected to practice dictation and sight-singing outside of class. Sight-singing and dictation will match the analytic and part-writing topics being covered (See the schedule of topics and activities on page 3).

As the content of the course is cumulative, and the pace is accelerated, it is crucial that students complete all assignments and readings on time. Late work will receive 2% deduction per day. Assignments, due dates, and grades will be posted on Canvas, UF's e-learning site, which students need to regularly check. Use your UF-email address for class communications.
