<u>Course Description</u>: An introduction to the principles and techniques of arranging, instrumentation, and orchestration. The course will introduce the standard instruments of the modern orchestra and wind ensemble, discuss choral arranging, and begin a discussion of creative orchestration practice.

Course Requirements: Students will complete all readings, listenings, and assignments on-time (approximately one assignment per week). Late submissions receive 2% deduction per day. Assignments, due dates, and grades will be posted on Canvas, UF's e-learning site, which students need to regularly check. Use your UF-email address or Canvas for class communications. Three major projects will be assigned throughout the semester. Some projects will be read through in class. Students willing to do an in-class demonstration on their major instruments are invited to do so, and will be allowed to waive one written assignment (not major projects)—see the instructor. There will be three exams (those include listening exams).

<u>Textbook</u> (required):

<u>Materials</u>: Students will need manuscript paper for assignments. Use of music printing programs (e.g. Sibelius and Finale) for some assignments is required, either on your personal computers, or in the Computer Lab.
