**COURSE OBJECTIVES**: To explore and learn techniques required to act in front of the camera for film, television and commercial work. Especially through single camera work.

- A. To get over the terror of watching yourself on screen!
- B. To establish a common vocabulary that serves as a foundation for the camera.
- C. To increase on camera observational skills and develop self-awareness through exercise and improvisation.
- D. To develop in the student an understanding of the discipline of the art and to refine concentration skills necessary within that discipline.
- E. To learn how to be intimate, specific, and personal in front of the camera.

- C. Character-Process: In front of the camera.
