Modern Auteurs

This course explores concepts and styles of three of the most prominent auteur directors working today. David Lynch burst onto the filmic scene in 1977 with the surreal horror-noir Eraserhead and, twenty-five years later, his most familiar cast of characters kept their word and were once again to be found in the town of Twin Peaks. Like Lynch, Wes Anderson and Guillermo del Toro have defined and presented audiences with a fantastical worlds filled with zany and terrifying characters — from a crime caper in bubblegum pink hotel to a child's nightmarish fairytale; or a forbidden love story and an Isle of Dogs. Students will screen films from all three directors throughout the semester and analyze design elements in addition to visual structures of narrative and cultural import and response. No prior film training is expected and the course will cover visual analysis for film in addition to film theory.
