Course Objectives:

The course will explore the dialogue between dance and visual art. Its purpose is to provide students a platform for creative development within a wide and multidisciplinary context. The course will allow the students to develop conceptual aspects touching upon issues such as: biography, identity and gender. It will also provide a platform for investigating the relations between movement, drawing and sculpture, and exploring the range between stillness and motion.

Methods of the Course

The course will encompass group sessions, individual instruction, project presentations, and research between lessons. The course will be composed of structured assignments, including a final, individual project that will be presented at the end of the semester.

"The Body" as the course's main theme will be explored by means of three stages:

- 1. Body material
- 2. Body object
- 3. Body space

The course will be enriched by the presentation of the work of artists who examine the dialogue between dance and visual art.

Materials and Supplies

Each student must bring the materials required for their own process.

At least 80% of the lessons.

Attendance and active participation - 20%

The student's creative and practical process, advancement and research – 35%

Presentations throughout the course, including final project – the assessment will be based on quality, depth, commitment to the process, artistic and conceptual complexity - 45%
