## **Course Description:**

The discourse of ornament from Vitruvius to Loos is freighted with philosophical, even moral, implications. This seminar will examine the problem of ornament in the western tradition from a broad, diachronic perspective, considering it as adornment, as surface, as artifice, as craft. We will move from the rhythmically rising and falling fortunes of architectural ornament, to the role of ornament in constructing and deconstructing the minor arts. In addition to investigating material remains of all kinds, we will closely read primary and secondary sources from antiquity to the present.

## Course Objectives:

-To gain familiarity with the philosophical, architectural, and art historical discourse surrounding ornament in the western tradition.

-To gain familiarity with key media, motifs, and techniques related to ornament

-To apply, orally and in writing, art historical and philosophical frameworks of analysis to the content of the course
