COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will explore the creative production of time-based media using digital video and effects. Emphasis on advanced video concepts, techniques, and compositing. This course will focus on advanced video techniques using the Adobe Creative Suite. We will study concepts in cinematography, editing theory and sound; Compositing - live action and 2d/3d elements with green screen and motion tracking; and more abstract techniques such as rotoscoping and motion graphics.

PREREQUISITE KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS

PURPOSE OF COURSE

To introduce students to digital audio and video production tools as well as the fundamentals of effective visual storytelling with time-based media. The students will learn industry standard practices in applied creativity.

COURSE GOALS AND/OR OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Use non-linear editing software to organize and sequence images efficiently.
- 2. Use 2D/3D compositing software to develop visual effects.
- 3. Apply cinematic composition techniques to advance and compliment a story.
- 4. Learn basic color correction and audio techniques for video production.
- 5. Identify and effectively utilize lighting instruments for cinematic effect.
- 6. Describe characteristics of well-designed and executed production.
- 7. Demonstrate skills in the use of industry standard tools.

COURSE SCHEDULE:

The course incorporates lectures, in-class exercises, quizzes, exams, and assignments to apply and reinforce skills learned. Additionally, students will be asked to participate in weekly online critiques to strengthen their skills in analysis and critical thinking. Individual assignments will be explained in detail

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as the course progresses. The class will incorporate a Final Exam and a Final Group Project. The Final Group Project will be due on the Final Class day.
