Singer's Diction English, MUS 2211 Fall 2019

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Office Hours

Class Meetings

The class meets Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays promptly at 5th period (11:45 a.m.) in Room 142 of the Music Building. The course ends with a capstone in-class activity on Monday, October 14, 2019.

Course Description

The course is an interactive workshop that develops lyric diction skills in the English language. The International Phonetic Alphabet, the standard tool for proper pronunciation in all languages, serves as the basis for study. The principles shall be applied to the delivery of text in vocal repertoire (including song, musical theater, opera and oratorio) of the British Isles and America. Classroom activities provide students practical procedures for achieving a confident performance of texts to be sung in English. Aspects of vocal health will be discussed throughout the eight-week term.

Textbook and Materials

The required textbook for the course is *Singing and Communicating in English: A Singer's Guide to English Diction* by Kathryn LaBouff (New York NY: Oxford University Press, 2008). *The Singer's Manual of English Diction* by Madeleine Marshall (New York NY: Schirmer Books, 1953) is a recommended resource available in the bookstore, for online purchase, or in the UF libraries.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of course, students will be able to recognize the phonemes and transcribe the symbols for English language words, using the International Phonetic Alphabet. Students will be able to enunciate clearly in English both in speech and song. Students will have skills to evaluate poetic meaning and historical context for texts set by British and American composers. The acquired skills are applicable for further study of vocal repertoire in foreign languages.

Measurement Tools

Attendance, initiative and progress are the main criteria for grading. The measurement tools for these criteria are: a.) quizzes, class activities and homework assignments, b.) final

exercise, c.) attendance and class participation, d.) class presentations and e.) singer's notebook project.

Quizzes, Class Activities and Final Exercise

Quizzes, class activities and homework assignments are intended to evaluate a student's command of newly introduced material. The final exercise is comprehensive in scope, demanding knowledge of the International Phonetic Alphabet and its application to written and oral texts in English. The exercise includes a dictation and a survey of rules and historical data. Prompt attendance for any quizzes and the final exercise is required. Under extenuating circumstances, please notify the instructor and provide documentation.

Attendance and Class Participation

Singer's diction helps to prepare students for a professional life in music. Because of the brevity of the course (8 weeks) and its importance to students in the limited access majors of music or musical theatre, prompt class attendance is mandatory. Lateness is at times unavoidable. Please call the instructor's office phone before 11:30 am. After 11:30 am, please text a classmate to report your anticipated arrival. Excused absences are those officially sanctioned by the University of Florida. https://catalog.ufl.edu/UGRD/academic-regulations/attendance-policies/ Discretionary, unexcused absences are unacceptable in this brief course. Unexcused absences or unreported lateness will result in a deduction of two (2) points against the course grade the first time, and three (3) points for each subsequent occurrence. Be careful to deal with anticipated absence or lateness in the manner described above.

Class Presentations

Each student will present poetic English texts in spoken and sung form. Students should perform on the assigned day. In case of extenuating circumstances, students must notify the instructor at least 24 hours prior to the day of the scheduled presentation. Students must prepare the presentation repertoire with the course accompanist. The grading criteria for class presentations are musical and textual preparation, IPA and diction accuracy, poetic and historical score study. An assessment sheet will be distributed early in the term. Each student will receive feedback from peers and instructor.

Dates for Class Presentations

First Class Presentations (graded S/U): September 23 and 25 (Rehearsals 9/20) Final Class Presentations (25% of final grade): October 7, 9, and 11 (Rehearsals TBA)

Singer's Notebook

Each student will gather all materials from the course into a 3-ring binder organized with clearly defined dividers to be submitted at the conclusion of the course. (The notebook represents 35% of the semester grade. An assignment sheet and a grading rubric will be distributed early in the term. The materials will include quizzes (graded/corrected), all daily handouts, all homework assignments, all daily class notes, all presentation materials and extra credit work. The notebook should be carefully ordered and reflect its future use as a resource in subsequent performance preparation situations.

Phonetic readings must be neat and legible. Because many symbols have similar shapes, it is important to be distinct in your penmanship. Please do not print phonetic readings or poetic interpretations directly from Internet or published sources when transcriptions are poetic interpretations. Present the poetic interpretation in your own words. All assigned transcriptions should be original work from your hand. It is wise to use pencil.

For all assignments requiring research, you must cite your sources. A field trip to the Architecture and Fine Arts Library will provide you the tools for research sources and citations.

All work should be submitted on time. In case of an excused, documented absence, please consult with the instructor regarding alternative assignments.

From time to time, quizzes occur in class. You will know the date of a quiz one week prior to the class period in which it occurs. Should you need to be absent for an excused, documented reason, please consult with the instructor regarding an alternative assignment.

The final exercise is an in-class, open book activity requiring access to a textbook and your completed notebook. Prepare accordingly.

In the voice area, the dress code for class performances does not include shorts or jeans.
