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Course Description

A forum for students to explore the role of research, research paradigms, critical issues, emerging events, scholarly writings, and professional organizations in music education through interaction with prominent speakers, faculty, and each other. A venue for sharing research and navigating the path to establish a scholarly identity and academic career.

- 1. Interact with prominent speakers from the UF campus and wider profession.
- 2. Demonstrate intellectual curiosity through exploration of scholarly topics in music education.

Attendance

The dynamics of this class, and its ultimate value to you, require you to come to the colloquium prepared (read materials, when assigned), bringing questions and comments to stimulate discussions.

ASSESSMENT

- 2. Come prepared to each colloquium. At times, a brief article or other foundational reading may be assigned prior to a colloquium.
- 3. Fully participate in the verbal discourse that occurs during each colloquium session.
