Course Description

During the fall semester, MUE 2450 Woodwind Skills 1 (clarinet and flute sections) will be offered to all music education majors. MUE 2450 Woodwind Skills I is the prerequisite course for enrollment in MUE 2451 Woodwind Skills II, which is offered in the spring semester. The sequence of study for each instrument is eight weeks. Students will be introduced to the instruments in a structured sequence of teaching steps. The texts provide the written material, while the instructor will provide guidance and technical assistance. There will be regular playing tests given throughout the course. During the eighth week there will be a final examination in which students will demonstrate their teaching and performing skills in class.

Course Objectives

- A. To acquire basic playing and teaching skills on the clarinet.
- B. To involve students in the basic aspects of clarinet performance and pedagogy and enable them to teach those skills to beginners. The basic skills to be emphasized include the following: embouchure, tone production, fingerings, hand position, articulation, and basic instrument maintenance, along with other related techniques.

Course Requirements

Each student is required to attend every class and to learn all assigned materials. In order for the class to progress together, it is imperative and expected that all students prepare and practice outside of class on a daily basis. Each student is expected to work diligently towards obtaining a secure foundation in the fundamental performance and pedagogical aspects of clarinet playing. **During the course, each student will be responsible for keeping a notebook.** Notebook content must contain relevant pedagogical information from class notes and materials, such as fingering charts and handouts given in class. All topics in the notebook must reflect the basic teaching techniques of the instrument.

Course Materials

A. Required texts:

- B. Required Materials and Supplies:
 - a. Instrument, mouthpiece, and reeds will be supplied.
 - b. Pencils
 - c. A 1.5-inch, 3 ring binder with a clear insert pocket on the front, back and sides to assist with the labeling of the folder
 - d. 7-tab dividers with labels that can be inserted into the tab or printed and inserted in the tab

Grading Procedure

Semester grades will be based equally on the student's performance in both the clarinet and flute sections of the course. Each grading component for the clarinet section will be graded independently. The points awarded by the instructor for each component will be added together and the total points earned will dictate the grade.

Component points will be awarded as follows:

- Midterm Playing Test (max. 10 points)
- Notebook (max. 20 points)
- Final Playing Test (max. 10 points)
- Written Final (max. 20 points)
- Quizzes and Assignments (max. 15 points)

- Final Teaching Demonstration (max. 15 points)
- Participation and Attendance (max. 10 points)

Total possible points for the clarinet section of the course: 100

Extra credit can be earned with approval from the instructor. Additional points can be awarded for exceptional notebooks and for research projects undertaken.

Grading Components

- 1. *Playing Tests:* Playing test points will be awarded on the quality of the performances and how effectively the techniques covered thus far are exhibited. There will be one midterm playing test and one final playing test in this course, which will include material that is essential to developing clarinet players. Proper preparation from the very beginning and practice time outside of class will help you to succeed on each playing test. Each test will take no more than 10 minutes and will be done either during or outside of class time.
 - a. Midterm Playing Test:
 - i. One Octave Scales: C, Bb (60 bpm), lowest octave
 - ii. Two Octave Scales: G, F (60 bpm), all scales begin with the lowest octave
 - iii. Chromatic Scale: Low E to fourth space E in quarters (60 bpm)
 - iv. Selected Playing Excerpt: TBA

- b. Final Playing Test:
 - i. One Octave Scales: D or Eb (60 bpm)
 - ii. Two Octave scales: To be selected from G, C, A, F, Bb (60 bpm)
 - iii. Chromatic Scale: Low E to high C in quarters (60 bpm)
 - iv. Selected Playing Excerpt: TBA
- 2. *Final Written Test*: Written test points will be awarded based on how clearly and concisely all answers are written and expressed. This final written test will include material that is essential to developing clarinet players. The written test will also include an analysis portion. Students will be given a copy of the clarinet parts from a piece of music from either the Florida Bandmasters Association or Florida Orchestra Association music lists. You will analyze the 1st, 2nd, and/or 3rd clarinet parts for tuning issues, necessary alternate fingerings, articulation, altissimo range, and any other issues your future clarinet players might run into. Create a detailed outline of how you would assist your clarinet students in effectively learning the piece, referencing strategies from class for each issue.
- 3. *Notebooks:* Points awarded will be based on content, organization, and quality. For this class, you will be creating your own textbook through the collection of materials presented. I encourage you to keep in mind the long term as you create this book and include tools and tips that will help you as you teach beginning clarinetists. Feel free to include additional material from your own research and findings, not just limited to those discussed in class. No handwritten pages will be accepted, so please type and organize all classroom notes. Notebooks will be due on October 2 for the first rotation and November 25 for the second rotation. **Late binders will not be accepted.** Your binder should be divided into 5 sections with 2 extra sections for miscellaneous materials:

Basics

Equipment

Fingerings

Clarinet Family

Resources

Subtopics that will fall under each main topic will be defined as the course progresses. Further information will be provided during class.

4. *Final Teaching Demonstration*: The teaching demonstration will be graded on the quality of the presentation, and how effectively the basic teaching steps are presented. Students in the course will find a random student on their own (one who has never taken the course or ever played the clarinet) to teach them the basics of the clarinet and at least three notes. The teaching demonstration will happen on the last day of the clarinet

rotation during the written final – October 9 for the first rotation and December 4 for the second rotation.

- 5. *Quizzes and Assignments*: Review the syllabus regularly for upcoming quizzes and assignments. These quizzes and assignments will cover materials discussed and taught in class.
- 6. Class Participation & Attendance: Points awarded will be based on the instructor's assessment of the student's contributions to the class and commitment to the course and adherence to the attendance/tardiness policy.

Attendance/Tardy Policy
