Course Description: It is widely known that modernists from around the world have searched for inspiration in African art, but how have African artists engaged with modernity? This course will provide an overview of the major themes shaping modern art from Africa. It will begin by analyzing the impact of primitivism in the continent's artistic practices and conclude by looking at the farewell to modernity with the rise of the "global contemporary." The search for liberation from colonialism and imperialism was a particularly fertile ground for the development of modern art on the continent, which is why the period from the end of colonial regimes through the Cold War will be given special emphasis. Topics will include figures, movements and practices from areas as diverse as Algeria, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Nigeria, Senegal, South Africa and Sudan.

### **Course Objectives:**

- Familiarity with methodological nuances in researching modern African art through class readings, discussion, and writing assignments.
- Build critical analysis of readings from various periods in modern African art historiography.
- Attribute major artistic movements and figures to the national histories in which they appear while
  expanding skills on identifying pan-African connections in the development of modern art through
  readings and diagram assignment.
- Develop ability to engage with modern African art as producer of political, postcolonial, feminist, queer, and aesthetic theories through readings and class discussions.
- Develop oral presentation skills by managing a class discussion.
- Expand visual literacy by class activities and discussion centered on formal analysis.
- Polish skills in writing about art through short writing assignments.

**Required Readings:** Required readings will be posted on the Canvas e-Learning Course Website and should be done in preparation for classes. Please, bring a hard copy of the reading to class to allow optimal participation. Input in class discussion of the readings will be an essential part of the participation grade.

**Optional Readings:** A selection of relevant books have been placed on course reserves at the Architecture & Fine Arts Library and can consulted to complement required readings.

#### **Requirements and Grading**

#### **Assessments:**

- 10%: African map quiz (8/28) Students will have to fill in the name of all African nations on the map.
- 10%: Mediation of a class discussion (scheduled throughout the semester)
  Students will be responsible for mediating the discussion of a selected reading or work of art approved by the instructor.
- 10%: Attendance and participation in class In order to get an A grade for participation, students are not only expected to attend classes, but to actively engage in discussions.
- 15%: First short writing assignment (due 10/2)
  An essay question on a theme discussed in previous classes and readings will be sent by e-mail 10 days prior to the assignment's deadline.
- 15%: Second short writing assignment (due 10/30)
  An essay question on a theme discussed in previous classes and readings will be sent by e-mail 10 days prior to the assignment's deadline.
- 10% Diagram (due 11/25)
  Students are expected to construct a diagram (i.e. Coggle) showing the many connections between the various artists, movements, and themes discussed throughout the semester. The diagram can be created digitally or by hand, but should be handed in as a hard copy.
- 30%: In-class writing assignment (12/4)
  A list of essay questions will be distributed two weeks before. Three of such questions will be part of the in-class writing assignment.

**Submission of Assignments:** All written assignments should be submitted in hard copy at the beginning of the class in which they are due. Delays may incur in a grade penalty and electronic copies will not be accepted. Written assignments must be in Times New Roman 12-point font, double-spaced, with 1-inch margins. Any citations must be done in Chicago-style. Please number and staple pages. Further details on all assignments and exams will be provided during the semester.
