

# Psychology of Music MUS 6685 3 credits Fall A 2019

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## **Course Description**

This is a graduate level course designed to introduce Psychology of Music to practicing music teachers. For the purpose of this course, Psychology of Music will be considered both a <u>body of knowledge</u> concerning human interactions with the art of music and as a <u>method for investigating</u> such interactions.

#### **Course Goals**

- Students will recognize Psychology of Music as a method for investigating human involvement with music.
- Students will become familiar with representative findings of research related to involvement with music as performers, creators, listeners, and teachers.
- Students will develop skill in accessing and interpreting research in Psychology of Music.
- Students will develop skill in utilizing observation, interview, questionnaire,, and reflection as tools for gathering data relating to human interactions with music.

• Students will demonstrate skill in writing a Review of Literature.

## **Course Format/General Expectations**

A combination of reading, group discussion, and exploratory exercises will constitute the learning activities of this course. Within each of the 7 modules students will:

Read 1-3 chapters in the text, a journal article and complete a short quiz on that material.

Participate in a group discussion

Carry- out and discuss a "Teaching Application"

In addition, students will become familiar with published research and complete a written Review of Literature as the final project in the course.

Emails will be responded to within 24 hours during the week and 48 hours on the weekend. If a phone or video chat consultation is desired, those may be arranged directly with the instructor. # **Course Assignments:**

Note: The following are brief descriptions of the course assignments. It is highly recommended that students follow links to and read the

complete description of each assignment and the rubric that will be used to assess those assignments before beginning work.

## **Reading Assignments:**

Basic information about the various topics of the course will be obtained from the required text. Several chapters and a journal article have been assigned for each module. You will be expected to read this material before completing other module activities. A quiz, consisting of 10 multiple choice items will measure your comprehension of the material read for each module. Each quiz item is worth one point, with quizzes contributing a total of 70 points (7%) of your total course grade.

## **Discussion Assignments**

You will engage in dialogue with others in the class and with your instructor on a topic in each module. Discussion starters will be provided and will be based on material from the assigned reading. You will respond to this Discussion Starter, then continue the dialogue by posting responses to two or more postings of others. For a complete description of the discussion assignment, see the "Discussion Assignment Overview".

Participation in each weekly discussion will be worth up to 40 points for a total of 280 points 28% of the total course grade. There will be an additional discussion in the final week of the course in which you will reflect on your experiences in the course. That discussion will be worth up to 20 points.

# **Teaching Applications Assignment**

To demonstrate your understanding of one aspect of each module and to develop your skill in utilizing tools for collecting and utilizing data in Psychology of Music you will carry out a Teaching Application within each module. A specific teaching activity has been designed, and often teaching materials provided for you to utilize with a student (or other individual) or a group of students. Participation in a discussion with others in the class and your instructor will provide evidence of your completion of the Teaching Application assignment. For a more detailed description of this assignment see the "Teaching Application Assignment Overview".

Each Teaching Application Dialogue will be worth 45 points for a total of 315 (32%) of the total course grade.

# **Review of Literature Assignment**

You will familiarize yourself with research literature in Psychology of Music and write a Review of Literature as the final project in this course. You will begin work on this assignment in the first week of the course and there will be components due

within each module of the course. This assignment is also designed to prepare you for completing the literature review that will be part of your Capstone Project. See the "Review of Literature Assignment Overview" for a more complete description of this assignment. The various components of the Review of Literature assignment will be worth a total of 315 points, or 32% of the total course grade.
