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Prerequisites. Placement via the Graduate Theory Diagnostic Exam or achievement of a C or better in Graduate Review of Theory.

Course Description. The aims of this course are to reinforce theoretical and analytical skills for all periods of Western classical music, and to provide students with sufficient comprehension of theoretical approaches for graduate and professional research in music.
