OBJECTIVE: The purpose of this class is to learn and practice the techniques of scenic painting. One will have the chance to practice and refine their skills through a varied of exercises and assignments.

PROGRAM OUTCOMES: This course will address the following outcomes:

- 1. Develop skills necessary to look at a texture and determine a time efficiently way to reproduce it with scenic paint on large scale surface.
- 2. Provide students with guidance and training to use scene painting equipment efficiently.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

After completing this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Understand and use different scenic painting tools and techniques effectively.
- 2. Read a particular paint elevation and determine what method must be taken to execute it.
- **3.** Be comfortable reproducing wood, brick or marble textures on various surfaces in a timely manner.

REQUIRED MATERIALS:

<u>Rosco Finch paint brush set</u> is highly recommended. Brushes ranging from 1/4" to 3" in size. A brush set ranges from \$120- \$150 but brushes can also be purchased individually or second hand. The shop does have some brushes available but it would benefit you greatly to have your own brushes.
