

Course Description:

The design thinking technique, with its focus on problem solving in a collaborative setting, will be used to design work, create a prototype and carry out its low volume production.

You will work as a team involving other disciplines i.e. engineering, architecture, etc. to design and produce a prototype then product for low volume production. There will be many design resources and current industrial practice covered. IDEO and the concept of design thinking will

be a major influence on the process and product. A workshop involving an IDEO representative is intergal part of the class.

The course will be a seminar format, where students will be responsible for initiating individual research and the sharing of that research with the class. The classes will include lectures, demos, discussions, presentations, critiques and possible field trips. Your participation is critical to the success of the class.

Course Objectives:

- 1) Awareness of contemporary issues in ceramics
- 2) Ability to work collaboratively and problem solve
- 3) Ability to clearly, articulate ideas both in writing and speaking;
- 4) Participation in critiques for discussion and review of works produced;

Assessment and evaluation is based on:

- 1) As a design and production team:
 - a) Design a functional consumer product, made primarily of ceramic materials.
 - b) Create a prototype (3d printed, CNC routed, Laser cut, jiggered, hand crafted)
 - c) Manufacture at least 3 finished products
 - d) Make 3 presentations as the process progresses
- 2) Group work in researching, problem solving, deciding, constructing, producing
- 4) Continuing personal studio work based on an agreed Research Concept
- 5) Active participation in Individual and group critiques
- 6) Participation in JumpstART

Course Content and Assignments:

You are expected to continue your personal studio work as part of this class. There will be at least two class critiques scheduled. There will also be individual critiques on a scheduled basis.

The class calendar will be kept on CANVAS. Please note when various stages of the Design products are due. Assignments include research sketches, readings, presenting the work on the assigned dates and participating in group critiques and discussions, and follow-up analysis on the way to the next works.

Regarding personal studio work, <u>incomplete work is not allowed</u> for presentation at critiques. Participants working at large scale and/or on complex works that require more fabrication time than 6 weeks to complete may present completed multiple maquettes for mid-term critiques

that have the content and general look of the larger work and explore surface alternatives. If you plan to work this way, <u>you must discuss this with me</u> at the first individual critique when the Research Concept is approved.

It takes regular studio practice to develop skills and ideas. It is anticipated that you will be highly productive in your studio and show only the best of your works for critiques. Being selective from a larger group of works always makes for a stronger presentation.

***Projects made for this class may NOT be submitted to any other class for credit unless both faculty have given prior approval. Failure to follow this rule will be considered academic dishonesty.

A semester grade of incomplete will not be given for late work unless there is an excused absence involved. To be approved for an incomplete:

- 1) Students must have completed the major portion of the class with a passing grade of C or better
- 2) The student is unable to complete course requirements because of documented circumstances beyond his or her control;
- 3) The student and instructor have discussed the situation prior to the final critique

(except under emergency conditions);

4) The student will fill out the College of Fine Arts incomplete grade contract, which will be signed by the instructor and the chair and will detail the work to be completed and the date by which this must be done.

Attendance Policy:

Class attendance is central to the learning process and to your success in the course. It is expected that you will attend regularly and be punctual. Everyone will value this courtesy to the group. Group demonstrations and lectures, critiques, individual tutorials, and discussions will be scheduled for many class periods.

Plan to arrive promptly at 8:30 AM or as scheduled for individual critiques. Attendance will be taken right at the beginning of each class with a sign in sheet; lateness will be noted and will affect your grade when accumulated. On days individual crits are scheduled, but you are not on the list for a crit, there will not be a class meeting at 8:30 unless schedule ahead. Please use this studio time wisely. You will need to meet with your team on your design project and the individual crits will be scheduled by group to facilitate this.

I allow up to two absences without penalty. I do not need an excuse for these absences. Keep in mind, you must meet the requirements for that class with regards to the work missed and any assignments due. I do not repeat demonstrations so connect with a classmate as to what you have missed. A third absence will lower your attendance grade. Should you have a prolonged illness or problem that takes you out of class for more that 3 absences please come see me during office hours or by appointment to discuss this. A third absence will lower your attendance grade 5% and any absence following will do the same. Absences also affect your participation grade as you are not there to contribute to the class. Keep in mind you must meet the requirements for any class missed, the work missed and any assignments due. Should you have a prolonged illness or problem that takes you out of the class more than the above, see me as soon as possible to discuss.

The university recognizes the right of the individual professor to make attendance mandatory. After due warning, professors may prohibit further attendance and subsequently assign a failing grade for excessive absences. Students are responsible for satisfying all academic objectives as defined by the instructor. Clay:

Students may purchase clay tickets at the UF Bookstore. Clay tickets are \$15.50 at the bookstore. All clays are one ticket per 25-pound bag except Helios porcelain, which is 2 tickets per bag. Please fill out your clay tickets w/your name and information. You keep the larger part; your instructor keeps the smaller part. The ticket is submitted to your instructor to pick up the purchased clay in the Ceramics department. You may also choose to reclaim used clay. If you would like to mix your own clay recipe, please see Derek to have him make up a clay ticket and pay in advance for the materials.

Materials fee:

There is currently no materials fee that covers the cost of consumables, such as wax resist, cones for firing, kiln wash, glaze, and other items needed for student use.

Plaster, mason stains, other materials are to be paid ahead with the same process as buying clay. Costs are in a binder on the Crit Room door.

Studio supplies in common studio areas are meant for community use in those areas. Please do not take shop materials, carts and tools into your personal studio for extended personal use. At this point in your careers, students should be purchasing such items as rolling pins and banding wheels for personal use.

Sketchbooks:

Sketchbook/journals should be an important part of every artist's studio practice. Ideation, form development, notes from critiques can be kept in such a book. Regular practice and care in keeping the sketchbook can leave a valuable archive for the future. Your sketchbook should be with you in every class and in your studio during critiques.

Studio Notes:

All students are expected to follow the studio regulations as listed in Welcome to UF Ceramics.

- If a student does not actively use his/her/their assigned studio space outside of class time, it will be re-assigned. Space is limited and if it is used for inappropriate storage or a gallery for old work, etc. The studio should have the tools and equipment you need to work. Do not store things on the floor as it impedes clean up.
- EVERYONE must keep the studio a clean and healthy place to work. Plan to wet mop daily, clean dust off surfaces.
- Remove all work and personal equipment and supplies from shared studio spaces and kiln areas or it will be considered abandoned.
- Please work in a team spirit when it comes to cleaning public workspace such as the
 glaze and kiln rooms. Everyone using the space will appreciate any added effort on your
 part. If affects attitudes and aids in the safe use of the facility.
- Do not leave your work on community spaces. Please do not store anything on the floor.

Classroom Courtesies:

As per the University Policy related to Classroom Demeanor at the end of this syllabus, personal cell phone use is not permitted in class. Please set your phone on vibrate or silent. The use of laptops should be held to a minimum so that interaction with your colleagues can take place.

Food and beverages are allowed in the studio classroom, but not the glaze and kiln rooms.

Respiratory Protection

Health and Safety Specific Area information for Ceramics:

Area Rules:

- Follow all SA+AH Health and Safety handbook guidelines.
- Alcohol is forbidden in studios.
- No smoking on campus.
- No eating or drinking in the glaze or mixing areas
- Shoes closed toes must be worn at all times
- It is recommended that protective equipment be worn at all times: safety glasses when grinding, chipping shelves, etc., protective lenses for kiln viewing, gloves for hot objects, heat resistant aprons for raku, ear protection for grinding and sawing, rubber gloves for mixing hazardous materials
- Do not block aisles, halls, doors
- Do not bring children or pets into the studios
- Do not store things on the floor
- Do not park bikes in the building

- Clean up spills immediately
- Scoop up dry materials, mop up liquids, do not replace spilled materials in original source if spilled for they are contaminated
- Carry heavy and large trash bags loaded with trash to dumpster
- Place materials containing Barium and Chrome in the hazardous waste disposal area
- Do not sweep for this puts hazardous materials into the air; rather scrape up chunks and wet-clean area.
