**MATERIALS:** ProMark SD1 or equivalent snare drum sticks and practice pads provided by instructor

### Description

Percussion Skills is a study of percussion pedagogy/literature in preparation for teaching public school music grades five through twelve. The course is required of all instrumental music education majors, and can be taken by any music education major.

### Purpose

The purpose of this course is to prepare music education majors for the complexities of teaching percussion in a public school setting. All major areas of percussion pedagogy will be covered.

### Policies

Due to the nature of the class and the fact that many topics will be covered during each class period, attendance is mandatory. After the second unexcused absence, five points will be subtracted from the final grade for each subsequent unexcused absence. After four unexcused absences the instructor reserves the right to drop the student from the class. Please email prior to class or as soon as possible for valid absences.

April 7-9	Percussion in the band and orchestra, marching percussion (pp. 70-73)
April 14-16	Marching percussion, Written Exam IV
April 21	Percussion ensemble, Concert report and Article review due

### Concert Report

You are required to attend one concert (or a percussion/band rehearsal by an area public school music program if necessary) and write about percussion instrumentation, techniques, etc. Please try to comment

on the things that you observe as they relate to class discussion. If attending a concert, please attend a concert in which you are not performing for your paper. Acceptable UF concerts are Percussion Ensemble, Wind Ensemble/Symphonic Band, Orchestra, and Percussion Solo Recitals (full-length recitals). This paper should be approximately two typed pages long (double-spaced).

#### Article Review

You are also required to write a review of an article or articles concerning some aspect of **percussion pedagogy**. You should compare and contrast the information in the article with class material presented on that topic. The Music Library contains issues of *Percussive Notes*.
