PURPOSES AND GOALS

This course will trace the historical development of hymns in liturgical use, the scope of hymnic literature, and the major trends in hymnal compilation and editing. Course topics will include a survey of Western hymnody from its Latin roots to the contemporary American hymn. In addition, the course will compare and contrast all major denominational hymnals.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

This course will be taught in a modified seminar format. Each participant will be responsible for specific topic discussions during class meetings. After each historical unit, each class member will present a review of how these eras are represented in their chosen denominational hymnals.

HYMNAL ANALYSIS

Throughout the semester each student will conduct a comparative analysis of two denominational hymnals. The analysis will include a survey of those historic texts and hymn tunes contained in the representative hymnals. The analysis will most likely be in an outline or spreadsheet format that enables numerical tracking. Compare and contrast these denominational hymnals. Why are some historical eras more represented than others? Are any eras of hymnody missing? Is there a theological reason for this exclusion? Briefly discuss previously released hymnals by each of these denominations. What changes were made over the course of time? During the last week of classes each student will present a summary of their findings with colleagues.

NOTEBOOK

At the time of the final exam, the student will be required to turn in a course notebook. This notebook should contain notes from all lectures, handouts, definitions, annotated bibliographies, etc. The format of the notebook is left up to the student, however, the purpose of the notebook is to serve as a resource for the future. Don't forget to list websites references and other pertinent information gained throughout the semester. The notebook must contain an outline of the history of hymnody.

RESEARCH PAPER

Each student will be required to submit a short research paper written specifically for this course. The paper will consist of a minimum of 1250 words (about 5 pages double spaced). The paper may discuss any topic, composer, text writer, or religious movement(s) covered in this course. The term paper is due on or before **MONDAY, APRIL 20.**
