MUH 7938: Music and Migration

Course Description: This course explores the intersection of the interdisciplinary field of migration studies with musicology and ethnomusicology. We consider migration in several different cultural and historical contexts, from the United States, Latin America, and Africa to Europe, India, and China, with a particular interest in understanding what the study of music, culture, performance, and history can contribute to the study of migration. We focus on several thematic areas related to migration, for example comparative ethnography, diaspora, citizenship, transnational capital, gender, health, and environment.

<u>Response Papers:</u> Post a short, succinct response (about 250 words) to the course website by midnight on Sunday each week. Choose one or two of the readings from that week, and respond to them in the context of our ongoing discussions and/or your own research or experience.

<u>Final Paper:</u> A research paper of about 15 pages on an aspect of music and migration of your own choosing. Discuss possible paper topics early in the semester with Dr. Politz. Abstracts are due March 23. The final papers are due **April 27** by 5 p.m.
