COURSE DESCRIPTION + GOALS

This intermediate undergraduate course, Figure Ground, will provide an in-depth workshop and research-based experience for students across art disciplines. Students will be encouraged to leverage interdisciplinary research and image-based practices to generate original works of art through the semester. Students will work through digital and analog photographic imaging, as well as sourcing found and extant visual images to work with. Further, students will develop skills necessary in conceptually framing developing, and discussing their work vis-a-vis written and verbal presentations.

METHODS OF STUDY

There will be three projects in this class, each thematically determined by the instructor with class input. Students are expected to perform visual research to conceptually frame and develop each project, and include a short written or verbal statement to accompany their work. The course will be structured by a series of individual and community junctures. The class community, comprised of the instructor and students, will gather in-class around reading discussions, research workshops, and student critiques in an seminar-style framework. Research and lab days will be individually-driven workdays for students to perform individual research and studio work. The Instructor will hold one-on-one meetings with students during these periods, providing in-progress feedback, and research references.

COURSE UNITS

There will be four projects throughout the semester, each counting for 15% of the final grade. Each project, worth 20% of the total course grade, will factor in visual research, attendance, in-progress critiques, resilience, and the final product(s). There will be individual instructions, rubrics, and critiques for each project.
