Course Description:

This course provides sophomore and junior art history majors with a foundational overview of the history of theories of art and of research in the visual arts and a practical roadmap for researching and writing an art history paper.

Course Objectives:

Students will learn philosophical and theoretical approaches to writing about the visual arts from antiquity to the twenty-first century. Students will gain experience in research and writing as well as oral presentation and preparing and leading seminar discussion.

Assignments:

Each student will select a single object, or a discreet group of objects (subject to instructor approval) at the beginning of the semester. These will be introduced to the class at the second meeting, and will subsequently serve as the basis for your written work throughout the semester.

- **1. Discussion Leading**: Once during the semester you will be responsible for selecting a reading relevant to your research paper, presenting the assigned readings and leading discussion.
- **2. Object Description Paper**: After completing the assigned reading, you will write a one page ekphrasis, or description of your chosen object(s). This does not have to contain an argument, per se, yet, but will form the basis of your later work in the course. **Due Tuesday January 21.**
- **3. 4 Response/Reaction Papers**: Using your selected object as a lens or case study, you will write one reaction paper to a reading or readings of your choice three times throughout the course of the class. **Due February 11, March 10, and April 14.**
- **4. Peer Review**: You will share your Object Description and your Response Papers with your peers, and you will be responsible for writing one paragraph of constructive comments on the papers of one of your classmates (this will be done on a rotating basis and not with a single partner). Peer reviews are due one week after description and response papers are due.
- **5. Research Paper:** Throughout the semester you will be researching and writing a 15-page paper on the subject of your choice. A proposed outline and annotated bibliography are due on February 28. The final paper is due April 28. You will also present an abbreviated version of your paper in the last weeks of the class.
