SINGER'S DICTION SPRING 2020 <u>FRENCH</u> MUS 2221

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Course Description

Singer's Diction is a course for singers and choral conductors, intended to improve their capacity to respond with ease, accuracy and expression in foreign languages. French diction presumes an understanding of the International Phonetic Alphabet. Through poetic readings, culture study, musical performances, phonetic drills and grammar/vocabulary practice, students develop skill in presenting French texts set to music. Each student will be expected to perform regularly in class and complete all quizzes, homework and notebook assignments and a final take home examination. Grading for the course is based upon attendance, initiative and progress.

Student Learning Outcomes

Using the International Phonetic Alphabet as a source, students will learn to pronounce poetic texts in French with accuracy. Students will become familiar with the historical and cultural events that influence the interpretation of French poetry. This knowledge will facilitate expressive interpretations of art song, operatic and oratorio repertoire in the French language. These skills will be evaluated in the presentations given at the conclusion of the course. The singer's notebook will serve as a resource for future reference and learning.

Textbook and Materials

The textbook for the course is *Diction in Context: Singing in English, Italian, German and French* by Brenda Smith (San Diego CA: Plural Publishing, 2019). A recommended text is *Singing in French* by Thomas Grubb (New York, NY: Schirmer Books, 1979). Each student must own a French-English dictionary. *The Interpretation of French Song* by Pierre Bernac (New York, NY: W.W. Norton, 1970) is recommended. Supplementary material will be distributed regularly in class. Each student should have a notebook dedicated to diction materials. The singer's notebook forms a significant portion of the semester grade.

Measurement Tools

Attendance, initiative and progress are the main criteria for grading. The measurement tools for these criteria are: a.) quizzes, class activities and homework assignments, b.) final exercise, c.) attendance and class participation, d.) class presentations and e.) singer's notebook project.

Quizzes, Class Activities and Final Exercise

Quizzes, class activities and homework assignments are intended to evaluate a student's command of newly introduced material. The final exercise is comprehensive in scope, demanding knowledge of the International Phonetic Alphabet and its application to written and oral texts in French. The exercise includes a dictation and a survey of rules and historical data. Prompt attendance for any quizzes and the final exercise is required. Under extenuating circumstances, please notify the instructor and provide documentation.

Attendance and Class Participation

Singer's diction helps to prepare students for a professional life in music. Because of the brevity of the course (8 weeks) and its importance to students in the limited access majors of music or musical theatre, prompt class attendance is mandatory. Lateness is at times unavoidable. Please call the instructor's office phone before 11:30 am. After 11:30 am, please text a classmate to report your anticipated arrival. Excused absences are those officially sanctioned by the University of Florida. <u>https://catalog.ufl.edu/UGRD/academic-regulations/attendance-policies/</u> Discretionary, unexcused absences are unacceptable in this brief course. Unexcused absences or unreported lateness will result in a deduction of two (2) points against the course grade the first time, and three (3) points for each subsequent occurrence. Be careful to deal with anticipated absence or lateness in the manner described above.

Class Presentations

Each student will be expected to present one French méodie in spoken and sung form. The repertoire assignment given will be in consultation with the studio teacher. Presentations will be evaluated for the depth of preparation and the accuracy of diction only. Please dress appropriately when performing for the class. Please note: To receive full credit for any presentation, the materials and rehearsals in preparation for the presentation <u>must be delivered on time</u>. Students should perform on the assigned day. In case of extenuating circumstances, students must notify the instructor at least 24 hours prior to the day of the scheduled presentation. Students must prepare the presentation repertoire with the course accompanist. The grading criteria for class presentations are musical and textual preparation, IPA and diction accuracy, poetic and historical score study. Each student will receive feedback from peers and instructor.
