Introduction to APA Formatting for Application Writing Samples

Creating a Writing Sample from Scratch

If you don't have an existing writing sample, then you are free to create a new one. Start by picking any specific topic of interest to you. Some examples of previously submitted topics include: "How can painting workshops reduce stress for patients in the hospital?" or "How do dance classes impact the symptoms of Parkinson's Disease?"

You would then do some basic research on your topic for a simple 2-3 page essay (double-spaced) in APA format. Use formal language and well organized paragraphs in support of your research question. You can use the <u>arts in medicine research database</u>, https://scholar.google.com/, or a library journal database to research your topic. Find about 4-6 scholarly sources to help form your conclusions.

Notes on APA format

Whenever you state, paraphrase, or quote something that isn't your own original idea, make sure to use an <u>in-text citation</u> crediting the author by last name and year published (Reina, 2019). For your <u>references section</u> at the end of your paper, list your references in alphabetical order by last name of the primary author of each source. **No need to make a title page or abstract** for the purpose of this application writing sample. Writing a well-organized sample with APA citations is great practice and will make your application stronger. Even if you don't use APA correctly yet, the most important thing is that the essay is coherent and that you double-check your grammar and punctuation. There are online resources like www.grammarly.com for free for help with proofreading (not an endorsement). Should you want additional practice, online courses through providers like Lynda, Coursera, or others may be helpful. Check your local library or community college as they may be able to point you toward academic writing tutors and courses as well.
