Outcomes, and Activities



What You Will Learn

While we are unable to perform together live this semester, our virtual experience will give you the opportunity to learn a wider variety of skills and experience our music in a new way. This course will engage you in many areas of music beyond just playing your horn. We will also have more one-on-one interactions than would be possible in a live ensemble situation. Here is a list of the skills and concepts you will develop and refine in this class:

- Musical concepts of Tuning, Rhythm, Articulation, Dynamics
- Saxophone-specific techniques related to tonguing, sound production, reed care, practice strategies, and fingerings to improve tuning
- Audio and Video Recording skills
- Playing with a click track or recorded musical track
- Managing audio and video files for online submission

What You Will Do

In this course, you will participate in the creation of a "virtual" ensemble music video. First, as in any ensemble course, you will learn to play your parts. You will be aided in this by recordings, small group work, and one-on-one help sessions provided by the instructors. You will then proceed to record your parts in time with a provided recording or click track. Early submissions will be reviewed by the instructors and suggestions will be made for improvement before final submission deadlines. Detailed instruction on the recording process will be provided via live Zoom class meetings and in print.

Required Equipment

What You Will Need

- A saxophone: sopranino, soprano, alto, tenor, baritone, or bass. Students will be assigned to a part and will be assigned a school instrument, if needed. You will need to have your own reeds, neckstrap, etc.
- A computer. You will need a computer at home or a laptop you can take with you to a suitable location for recording. It will not be possible to complete this course in a computer lab--the only exception to this would be if you own a Zoom video recorder. See the UF Student Computing Requirements

- Headphones or quality earbuds
- You will also need a **cell phone**, or a very **high-quality webcam**, or a stand-alone **video camera**.
- An external microphone (USB or XLR+interface). If needed, the School of Music has a limited number of USB microphones you can check out for a day or two to make your recordings. Let me know if you need recommendations for good microphones. Microphones are in very high demand now, order one as soon as possible if you need one.
- Software needed:
 - Audacity for creating high-quality audio files (free download: https://www.audacityteam.org/download/ (Links to an external site.)
 - o Zoom videoconferencing software (free download: https://ufl.zoom.us/ (Links to an external site.)), and
 - PDF Reader for viewing your music (https://get.adobe.com/reader/ (Links to an external site.))
 - Most computers come with audio and video viewing programs. Contact the UF Help Desk if you need assistance wit this (352-392-HELP).
- You will also need access to a printer in order to print your music.
- Other helpful items to own: music stand, metronome (free phone app), tuner (free phone app), headphone/earbud extension cord.

Detailed instruction on the audio and video recording process will be provided via live Zoom class meetings and in print.



Course Policies

Instructional Methods

This course will include: six class meetings on Zoom, weekly video Announcements, one-on-one Zoom meetings with an instructor to refine your performance, and four small group study sessions. Feedback and support for your performance and recording projects will also be provided via Discussions and email correspondence.

Attendance

Please attend all Zoom class meetings. They will give us a good opportunity to connect and to address some of the more complex questions you may have as we go. If you have another class that meets at this time, or a really good excuse for missing the meeting, just let me know. I will make recordings of our meetings available online. To salvage your points from a missed Zoom meeting, just watch the recording (video link will be posted on the Meeting page with 48 hours) and send an email to ihelton@ufl.edu with the reason you missed and list two points from the video you found interesting or helpful (or funny). You may also contact me directly with questions regarding the content of these meetings.(If a lot of people start missing these meetings, this policy may change.)

All recording submission due dates are inflexible. It is expected that you will plan to complete your assignments before the final day. If you will be borrowing recording equipment, working ahead will be absolutely necessary. Penalty points will be applied for late recording submissions (see Grading Detail for info).

Group Study Sessions should take place at some point before the submission of the preliminary audio recording. Since you have to make a recording, please don't wait too long to schedule your study session.

Quizzes are based on material from the Announcement videos. Make sure you watch the videos before taking the quiz. You'll only have one attempt at the quiz.



Grading Detail

Grading and Assignments

Grades will be based on the quality of your playing, the on-time submission of recordings, mini-quizzes, and attendance at required study group and Zoom meetings. As in any ensemble, the majority of your grade will be determined by the quality of your performance. Due to the time needed to edit our videos, the next highest percentage of your grade will be based on the date you submit your recordings. As in any ensemble, if you don't do your part, it impacts everyone else in the class. There are a total of 100 points to be earned.



You can view your grades (points) for this course as they are earned on the <u>Grades</u> page. Points are listed on the Modules page and, of course, on the assignments themselves. There are 100 evenly-weighted points.

Graded projects will be submitted in various ways.

- Zoom meeting attendance will be registered according to your displayed Zoom name. If your Zoom screen name is not your full name, that's fine, we'll just need to record it. Let us know if it changes.
- Introductory videos will be submitted to YouTube and you will place links in the discussion section on Canvas.



Quizzes and Surveys



A reference recording of each piece we will play/record is linked on the Modules page. In every case, the original scoring for the work will be represented. When possible, a recording of the arrangement we are playing for saxophone ensemble will also be included.



Click Tracks and Play-Along Recordings

In order to coordinate our ensemble, we will all play along to the same recording. These recordings can be found in the class <u>Files</u> in the *Play-Along Tracks* folder.

Zoom Class Meeting Recordings

If you missed a class, or want to review information presented in class, you can review the recording. The link to the recording will be added to the Assignment page for that Zoom meeting within 48 hours after the class.

How to Practice with Recordings and Click Tracks

Recordings prepared for play-along use, and click tracks, will all have several clicks to count them in. Normally, I'll plan for a full four-measure count-off. We will all clap (in view of the camera) on the downbeat of the third measure, so practice for that.

Remember, recordings on YouTube can be played at slower tempos. So if you want to play along at a slower tempo for practice, just choose the speed you like from the settings icon in the video.



You can change the playback speed of an audio track (mp3 or WAV) in Audacity as well. Select the track (or portion) that you want to change, then from the Effect menu select "Change Tempo." You can use the slider to change the speed.

If there are tempo changes in the music we will be recording (*ritards*, *accellerandos...*), you'll want to practice these sections a bit more to learn the rate of change.

Use your headphones! Some cheap earbuds will not reproduce the lowest frequencies of the tenor and baritone (or other instruments in that range and lower). If you can't hear the low stuff in the part, it may be time to upgrade to a better set of earbuds or headphones. You shouldn't have to spend much, however.

When recording, you'll need to wear headphones/earbuds to hear the play-along track. So be sure to practice with your headphones/earbuds as well. You'll want to keep one ear open so you can hear your horn, otherwise you'll tend to overblow.

Once you can successfully play up to speed WITH the recording or click track, you are ready to make your own recording.

Introduction to the Modules


Module Overview

Each Module will address the practicing and recording of one piece of music. As in a live ensemble situation, all the music for the semester will be assigned at the beginning of the semester so that your practice sessions can include a little variety. As the semester progresses, you will be required to learn your music, record, and submit one piece at a time. There will be both an early and a final submission for each recording. The early submission will be reviewed by the instructors and suggestions will be made for improvement. Small student work groups and instructor-led individualized coaching will be incorporated as needed throughout the semester.
