<u>Course Objectives:</u> - The purpose of this class is to learn about the techniques, tools, language, and methods of scenic artists.

The class provides a laboratory for the practice of scenic painting procedures and guides the student to develop basic skills in color mixing, representing different textures and representing the volume by using the light and the shadow.

The class also prepares students to present and discuss their work, as they will do in a professional situation.

Class time will be used also to identify strengths as well as areas for improvement in order to broaden and refine individual abilities.

- **PROGRAM OUTCOMES:** This course addresses the following program outcomes:
- 1. Developing skills necessary to efficiently execute a paint elevation on typical theatrical surfaces.
- 2. Providing students with training that will enable them to actively participate in the painting process of the scenery for live performance.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: After completing this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Communicate and discuss with the set designer challenges and options related to a specific painted elevation.
- 2. Asses the techniques involved in reproducing a particular painted elevation on a large scale surface.
- 3. Reproduce a painted elevation on a large scale surface.

-four painting projects to be done on a personal scenic flat that will be built in class.

- 1. Create two different textures: marble and wood
- **2. Faux painting: entablatures** (2 of them, one on top of each of the textures)
- 3. ornament with drapery

4. a poster of choice. Prior approval of instructor is required.
