Course Description

In this course students will apply the knowledge they've acquired in Applied Theater for Health I to create an original theater for health project or workshop on a health topic of their choosing. With a focus on collaboration and group devising, students will research, develop, and conduct theater for health workshops in partnership with a community or campus organization.

Course Topics

1. Collective creation techniques
2. Participatory Research/Theater as Research
3. Devising techniques
4. Workshop proposal and design
5. Community relations and partnerships

Objectives

1. Students identify and discuss health issues to address.
2. Students propose and design an applied theater for health project.
3. Students evaluate and modify project proposals.
4. Students plan and manage a collaborative applied theater for health project.
5. Students research a health topic and construct a literature review
6. Students devise and construct an original applied theater for health project.
7. Students deliver projects to community or campus partners.
8. Students assess and evaluate their participation and project impact.

Course Format

Collaboration and creation in this course will follow the following structure:

Research: gathering

Synthesis: grouping, organizing, and eliminating ideas

Exploration: ideas translated into dramatic form

Refining: making choices, deletion and inclusion of work

Scripting: creating and editing drafts

Rehearsal: Synthesis of scenes and work into a cohesive structure

Performance: Workshops and public performances

Evaluation and Reflection

Assignments

1. Project Proposals: Students will present a written and oral program presentation to the class. This presentation includes: Project Mission, Goals, Objectives, and Methods. Workshop Outline, Community Partners, Timeline, & Measurable Outcomes and Evaluation Plan.
2. 1st Presentation of Workshop
3. 2nd Presentation of Workshop
4. Final Presentation of Workshop
5. Warm Ups: Students will lead warm ups before every class. Warm ups will be split up evenly by the students in the course.
6. Final Portfolio: The final portfolio will consist of a background statement on their topic of choice, a workshop script, project evaluation and an analysis and reflection paper on their process and project.
7. Participation: Theatre is a highly collaborative art form and students will navigate the inherent difficulties of group collaboration throughout the semester. Attending and actively participating in all classes is very important. After the one excused absence is used, students will be subject to a 20 point reduction in their participation grade per unexcused absence.
