Course Description

This course offers an opportunity for students to work with the instructor(s) of IDS 2935, UF Quest 1, *Revolution & Reconciliation in American and South Africa* to facilitate and improve the Reacting to the Past pedagogy used in the course. The Reacting pedagogy explores historical events through complex, rigorous, multi-week role-playing games. Students in HUM 4912 will assist the instructor with the two games played in the Quest course: *Patriots, Loyalists, and Revolution in New York City, 1775–1776* and *The Collapse of Apartheid and the Dawn of Democracy in South Africa, 1993*.

Course Goals

At the end of this course, students will be able to ...

Facilitate gameplay in a Reacting to the Past classroom

Improve student learning in a Reacting to the Past classroom by devising strategies and communications to assist other students

Analyze Reacting to the Past game mechanics and develop improvements or solutions to problems

Course Requirements

Attend game sessions led by the instructor for IDS 2935, Revolution & Reconciliation-30%

- While the student is invited to attend all the course meetings for IDS 2935, *Revolution & Reconciliation*, they are only required to attend the Reacting game sessions.
- Monday sessions meet from 4:05–6pm; Wednesday session meet from 5:10–6pm.

- Assist the instructor in monitoring gameplay and keeping score
- Offer office hours to discuss game strategy with students

Serve as Gamemaster with the instructor for Collapse of Apartheid—25%

- Work with instructor to begin each game session and execute the Gamemaster's planned interventions, for example, announcing important "news" at certain moments
- Work with instructor to devise solutions to problems that arise
- Coach students on strategy and content during game play
- Assist the instructor in monitoring gameplay and keeping score
- Offer office hours to discuss game strategy with students

If you are not willing to consent to have your voice recorded during class, you will need, during recording, to keep your mute button activated and communicate exclusively in Zoom using the "chat" feature, which allows students to type questions and comments live. Make sure to discuss your decision with Dr. Ross so she does not penalize your participation grade. The Zoom chat will not be recorded or shared. As in all courses, unauthorized recording and unauthorized sharing of recorded materials is prohibited. In using Discord, you are consenting to the terms of their privacy policy. If you would prefer not to use Discord, let me know and we will work something out.
