## **Syllabus**

## **Course Description**

First course in a sequence of courses that develop skills and understanding of written music theory. Skills covered will include writing and identifying scales, keys, chord progressions, basic form and analysis, as well as species counterpoint. The course will conclude with learning the rules and procedures for writing proper four voice chorales.

## **Exams**

A written midterm exam will be given halfway through the semester on all concepts covered in the first half of the semester. Types of questions and format will be discussed in the weeks prior to the exam. The final exam will take place on Friday, April 30<sup>th</sup> from 12:30pm to 2:30pm. This exam will cover material from the entire semester.

## **Assignments**

Assignments will be given out each week (a minimum of 1 per week) covering the material discussed in class and the readings. Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the specified due date. Late work will be accepted at a 10% penalty per each class it is turned in late. After 5 classes (or 3 weeks), a late assignment will no longer be accepted. This late work policy does not apply to excused absences.

#### **Quizzes**

Quizzes will be given periodically during the last 10-15 minutes of class to make sure students are keeping up with assigned readings and actively paying attention in class. They may be announced or unannounced. Formats of quizzes will vary based on content.

## **Attendance**

Each unexcused absence will deduct 10% of attendance grade (1% of final grade). Acceptable reasons for absence (excused absences) include illness, serious family emergencies, severe weather conditions, religious holidays, and participation in official university activities. Other reasons may also apply. If you know you are going to miss a class, please let the professor know in advance so necessary arrangements can be made.
