Course Description

This course is designed to instill an understanding of animation principles and produce quality 2D Digital animations implementing these principles and exploring various techniques. During the semester, the students will be assigned 8 weekly projects and two group-based projects focused on principles that utilize key aspects of the required software. For the final project, each student will create an animated film, 15-20 seconds in length, through which they will learn the production process of animation including writing a treatment, storyboarding, timing through animatics and final rendered animations.
