Course Objectives

Students will be able to

- design forms for specific meanings of structure considering form, space, composition, surface, proportion, function and content.
- generate, organize, and communicate ideas in 3D expression using clay in addition to other mediums.
- identify components and processes of basic glaze chemistry and application.
- critically analyze technical work and artistic expression of clay sculptures.

Course Description

This course is an introduction to three-dimensional form and design concepts using ceramic materials and processes. The projects investigate three dimensionality and visual dynamics including a study of form, space, texture, composition, and structure. Students will form an in depth understanding of three-dimensional concepts by learning basic sculptural strategies, hand forming techniques, and vocabulary, then applying these skills with clay as the medium. As students work on project assignments, they will be reading, researching, discussing, and responding to historical and current issues with three-dimensional concepts.

Course Structure

This course will be face-to-face with **expected** face mask coverage. If you are experiencing symptoms, or have tested positive for COVID-19 and are not cleared for campus, please **DO NOT** come to class. I will be working with students individually to make sure accommodations are made. Assignments can be submitted online via canvas. Demonstrations for each project will be available so no one falls behind.

Effective immediately, in light of new guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, we expect everyone to wear a mask at all times when inside any UF facility, even if you are vaccinated. Course Content

Course work will consist of 5 projects, 4 in clay and one on research, supported by assigned readings, web research, and sketchbook drawings. Detailed assignment requirements for projects will be covered at the beginning of each project. All projects involve preliminary research, exploration, readings, sketches, demonstration videos, and individual meetings with the instructor to finalize the proposed project. Project assignments will include a detailed description of the project, timeline, due dates, and specific requirements for readings and exercises. The projects for this class are conceptually based so that you will focus on a theme and find an individual solution that reflects your perspective. This course is fast paced so plan ahead to assure you will complete the assignment on time.

A typical week will involve lectures with images, group discussions, demonstrations,

individual meetings, work days, and critiques. Plan on spending at least 3 hours per week outside of class time on projects, at least 1 hour on readings, and at least 1 hour on research.

The general outline is based on the availability of technology and is subject to change. Please be mindful of the situation and be patient regarding last minute changes.

Student Expectations

- -Attend all class meetings.
- -Come to class on time, ready to work, with the necessary supplies.
- -Be attentive and engaged during demonstrations, discussions, critiques, and meetings.
- -Work in a disciplined manner during in class work time.
- -Challenge yourself creatively with each project.
- -Spend necessary studio time outside of class.
- -Complete assignments on time.
- -Participate in cleanup at the end of class, and keep a clean studio outside of class.
- -Participate in all group tasks including clay processing and kiln loading.
- -Spend a minimum of 3 hours outside of class time working on assignments

Email Policy

Email is the preferred method of communication outside of class time. I check my email regularly Monday-Friday from 9am-5pm and reply within 24 hrs. Note that an email received at 5:30 pm on a Friday may not be answered until Monday.

Sketchbook for Research

Each student is required to keep a sketchbook dedicated to this class and used for exercises, independent research, ideation, sketching, writing, recording, note-taking, and collecting information and resources. A sketchbook can be a collection of papers for drawing thoughts and ideas that are organized. This can use a variety of media such as pencil, crayons, colored pencils, paints, digital, etc. Sketchbooks will be checked throughout the course of the semester. Scanned/ photographed images of

sketchbook research will be uploaded to Canvas for each project. This is a representation of the ideation process for each project.

Studio Storage and Clean Up

<u>Please leave the studio clean.</u> Regardless of the condition you find it in, you are requested to leave it clean for the next person. Leave the work tables clear and clean. This also impacts your participation grade. This is a group studio, and we all need to pitch in to keep it a safe and healthy functioning work environment.

Each student is responsible for ensuring that his/her projects and materials are safely stored, displayed, installed, and removed from the classroom and critique space. Projects must be set up and removed from the critique space at the times and spaces designated for each project.

The instructor, the School of Art and Art History, and the Ceramics Area are not responsible for student work left in workspaces, installation spaces, the critique space, the shops, or the classrooms. Projects/materials are not to be stored in the group working space.

Please address any concerns, problems, and questions regarding this class to the instructor as they arise. The instructor is available during office hours, and by making an appointment for a special meeting time.

Evaluation

In addition to specific criteria defined by individual project goals, all projects will be graded with a rubric on their success in the following areas: concept development, use of design decisions to support your concepts, craftsmanship, and meeting deadlines for building and critique. As previously mentioned, a sketchbook is required for recording notes and ideas and the work must be finished within the specified deadlines.

- "Concept / Idea: This pertains to the ability to discover and define design problems and issues in a clear and consistent language.
- "Solution: This pertains to the quality of your visual and conceptual solution. Factors such as composition, inventiveness, originality, layout and craft will be considered in grading.

Grades will also be influenced by the following criteria: evolution from proposal to finished work, aesthetic concerns, and adherence to assignments, craftsmanship, skills development, conceptual rigor, experimentation, inventiveness, risk – taking, personal investment, and critical discussions.

Digital Documentation

Proper documentation of work is a crucial step in building your portfolios. There will be a tentative schedule posted for photographing days through-out the semester. I will show you the ropes on how to get a solid portfolio shot of your pieces. Those dates will be posted on canvas.

Process and Late Work

All projects, sketches, research, and reading discussions must be completed on time for full percentage of credit. Some assignments, such as the reading discussions and critiques, are due during a particular class and cannot be made up or redone. A missed class does not constitute an extension of an assignment. Specific due dates are stated on each project sheet, the calendar, and are announced in class. Failure to complete any project, sketch, research, critique or reading discussion on time will result in a drop of one full letter grade. Keep in mind, however, late work is better than no work.

Controlled drying of each project is necessary to meet set class expectations without projects cracking. Finish building all wet work on time for drying greenware and manage the careful drying of clay work. Clay requires regular attention to achieve good results. It cannot be rushed or neglected.

If the time-line states that a project is due at the beginning of class, turning it in at the end or after class is considered late. Work must be finished, documented, and submitted before

critique, unless otherwise instructed, or projects will not be critiqued and the grade will be lowered. It is the student's responsibility to turn in all work on time and complete all five projects. Full participation by showing completed work during all critiques is required along with active participation through shared ideas and commentary. Failure to meet deadlines will result in a zero for the specific project. For situations that are called to attention in advance, something can be arranged. Be sure to plan ahead.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance is required for the full semester. Always e-mail or call if you will not be in class. Missing class can result in major setbacks due to missed instruction, technical information, and feedback. You are responsible for all information given in class. All assignments must be submitted by the due date. Unexpected absence on critique days will result in a failing grade for the assignment.

Tardiness, leaving early and failure to attend will affect the grade as follows:

- Attendance affects your grade. Students have 2 absences without penalty
- Absence 3, 4, and 5 deduct 50 Pts. or 5% of your overall grade for each absence.

A 6th absence earns a grade of WF.

- If you miss more than 30 minutes of class you will be counted absent.
- Three later arrivals equal one absence.

Missing class on the day of a critique is the equivalent of missing a test.

If technical difficulties regarding UF's web server (Canvas, video playback, connectivity issues) will cause you to miss a due date, you MUST report the problem to the Help Desk and then email your instructor. Include the ticket number that you are given from the Help Desk in an email to the instructor to explain the late assignment/quiz/test. You are responsible for making sure that files you upload are accessible and open correctly.

Appropriate documentation from the student health service should be obtained for medical excuses. In general, acceptable reasons for absence from class include illness, serious family emergencies, special curricular requirements (e.g., judging trips, field trips, professional conferences), military obligation, severe weather conditions, religious holidays and participation in official university activities such as music performances, athletic competition or debate.
