Grading:	Grading will be based on the principals of attendance, initiative, and progress outlined in the voice area handbook. These principals will be evaluated through preparation, weekly lessons, memory tests, and the jury.

Studio Class:	Studio classes (combined and individual) are considered an integral part of voice study. Timely presence in studio class is expected. Each student should support studio peers by attending degree recitals or dress rehearsals. Please mark calendars and plan work/social obligations accordingly.
Lessons:	Prompt attendance at all lessons and rehearsals with recording device. Performance in each lesson should demonstrate consistent improvement with the integration of concepts and corrections addressed in previous lessons. Improvement is the result of consistent practice and preparation.
Preparation:	Preparation of a selection is deemed thorough if IPA, Word-by- word, and poetic translations appear in the score, all notes and rhythms have been learned, and comparative listening/program notes are accomplished. There will be assignments in canvas to help guide this portion of the course.
Memory Tests:	Throughout the semester you will present a memory test of each to be presented at the jury. This will include a dramatic performance of the text (spoken), followed by a performance of the song or aria by memory. (see canvas for test dates)
Jury:	This will serve as the final exam for the course. A minimum of six pieces will be offered to the panel. The student and instructor will choose the first piece. The jury panel will select any addition piece or pieces they wish to hear.

Course Expectations:	The ability to "count-sing" the melodic material, to "vowel-sing" the text along with the insertion of IPA transcriptions, word-by- word translations and poetic texts in the semester's repertoire are expected for repertoire assigned for weekly lessons. Each student will be expected to complete assignments on time.
Collaborative Pianists:	Every student is assigned a collaborative pianist who will attend lessons and accompany studio class and recital performances. The collaborative pianist can create rehearsal recordings to assist with music learning. A weekly rehearsal session with your collaborative pianist will be arranged. The attendance policy of the studio applies. It is the responsibility of the student to pay the collaborative pianist in a timely fashion.
Communication:	The recommended methods of communication are in person, phone, text, and email. Although we are using canvas for submitted assignments and grading, the email functions do not always provide consistent notifications to the instructors.
